HOP QUOTATIONS

RAISED A CENT

The Oregonian has added a cent to the quotation of hops to its commercial columns, probably on bad advice from Germany, New York, California and the Oregon prairie yards. Conrad Krebs, the big Marion county grower, who, by the way, has 1700 bales or 1900 bales of 1901 hops, says there are hundreds of dead bopyards in the state—absolutely dead—and that though the vines look well when you touch the blossoms they fall apart. He says many of the growers do not know the conditions, but next week will tell the tale.

Lane county bopyards, with few exceptions, occupy bottom lands, and from this class of planting there is no complaint. There is probably no question but the hop industry of Marion and Clackamas counties has been hard hit.
