TEN MEN AFTER STARR

Officers Galore Beating Brush in Cascade Mountains

Fleeing Witness Will Probably Not Be Captured As He Knows the Mountains Thoroughly

Ten officers of the law are now in pursuit of Ernest Starr, supposed to be in hiding in the Cascades to avoid giving testimony against his uncle, Congressman J. N. Williamson, now on trial with Dr. Van Geesner and M. R. Biggs in the United States court for alleged subornation of perjury. He has not yet been apprehended, and it is believed that with quite a start of the officers he may remain in hiding until after the trial is completed and his services no longer required. As he was not served with a subpoena to appear as a witness before he left Portland, it is not believed that he can be punished for fleeing.

Deputy United States Marshal W. B. Griffith is in pursuit of the witness from the west, having left Eugene to follow the runaway's trail into the mountains, and S. Henderson, another deputy in the office of Marshal C. J. Reed, has taken the trail from Prineville. Other officers galore are beating the bush along the deep gulches of the mountains where the nephew of Williamson is supposed to have concealed himself.

STARR KNOWS THE LAND.

Starr is camp-tender for the sheep-raising firm of Williamson & Geesner, and has operated in the Cascade foothills for several summers and knows every trail and canyon in that country. His duty is to carry food to the herders and salt for the sheep, while they are on the mountain range in the summer, on packhorses over the mountains, and in doing this he has learned the country thoroughly.

Every effort is being made by the government to capture him, but in case he is not located soon enough to appear at the present trial it is the intention of the prosecution to have the testimony offered by Starr at the last trial introduced. If it can be shown that the defense is in any way responsible for Starr's flight this will be allowed beyond question. If he is captured before the trial is ended it is believed that his testimony can be interpolated at any point before the jury retires. However, in case he does not appear as a witness, it is not considered at all fatal to the case of the government, as he is expected to testify merely to what other witnesses have sworn to on the stand, namely, the implied contract with Geesner to transfer the claim to the latter upon final proof, Geesner supplying the money to acquire the claim.—Telegram.

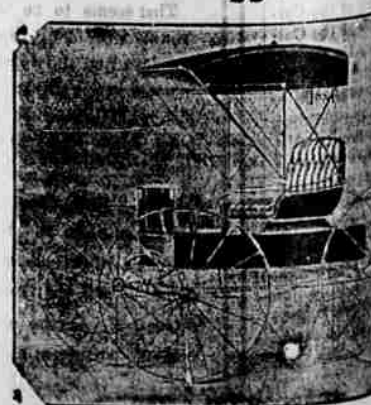
