New Gordon Block Has Narrow Escape—Spontaneous Combustion

What came near being a disastrous fire in the new Gordon block was narrowly averted Saturday night. Painters have been at work on the interior of the building for some time past, and have been in the habit of leaving their oily rags lying around the building at night. Mr. Gordon cautioned them not to do so, fearing that during this hot weather they might catch fire by spontaneous combustion.

About 11 o'clock Saturday night, after the day's work was finished, Mr. Gordon made an investigation of the premises and found some rags adrift in the street near the building. They had been used by the painters and the heat of the oils caused the fire. Some more similar rags were found inside the building and they would no doubt have soon ignited and caused an expensive fire had they not been discovered in time.

Mr. Gordon is just now moving his large stock of furniture and household goods and carries little insurance at present. His loss would have been great had a fire occurred.
