IRRIGATE FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

R. A. Maltzan Has Pur- chased Gasoline En- gine and Pump

Says His Raspberry Crop Would Have Netted Him \$500 More Had He Irrigated Before

R. A. Maltzan, who conducts a fruit and vegetable farm north of the city, has purchased a gasoline engine and a centrifugal pump with which to ir- rigate his place. Mr. Maltzan, in conversation with a Guard reporter today, stated that had his raspberry- alone been irrigated this year he would have made at least \$500 more than he did off of them. He says that hereafter every summer he will irrigate and expects to double his profits off of fruit and vegetables alike.

Mr. Maltzan is a progressive young farmer, and realizes that the time is coming when irrigation in the Wil- lamette valley will be recognized as necessary to insure big crops. The Guard looks for a large number of farmers to install private irrigation plants on their places before another dry season comes.
