**MILL TO
RESUME**
The Booth-Kelly Co. Is
Scouring Country for
Men
Report That Another Mill or Two
Will Be Erected but Not Con-
firmed—\$750,000 to Be
Spent

The Guard has obtained informa-
tion through persons connected with
the headquarters of the Booth-Kelly
Lumber Co. in this city that the com-
pany is now scouring the country for
men to operate the big mill at Wend-
ling. It is not learned when the mill
will resume, but it is thought between
the first of September and the first of
October. It is also learned that the
company wants more men for the mill
at Coburg, the intention being to in-
crease the running hours of that
plant.

WILL SPEND \$750,000
From the same source the Guard
learns that the company has a fund of
\$750,000 which it will soon expend in
the operation of its big milling and
logging systems. It is stated that one
or more additional mills may be erect-
ed, but this report cannot at present
be confirmed. The company owns
large tracts of fine timber in the Mos-
by Creek and Row river countries
above Cottage Grove, and it may be
that it intends to erect a mill in that
vicinity. About two years ago it was
announced that the company would
build in that section, but the depres-
sion in the lumber market came about
that time and the project was tempo-
rarily abandoned.

LUMBER MARKET GOOD.
The lumber market has picked up
wonderfully in the last few months
and every sawmill of any consequence
in the state is now rushed with or-
ders. A man just down from a trip
to the Bohemia mines states that the
five mills along the Oregon & South-
eastern railroad are unable to keep up
with their orders and are turning
many away. All the mills of the
Booth Kelly Co. are rushed.

OLD-TIME PROSPERITY.
The reopening of the Wendling mill
and the consequent operation of the
adjacent logging camps means the re-
sumption of the great prosperity
which prevailed here for several years
prior to the closing down of the plant.
The Booth-Kelly Company's opera-
tions have always been a great factor
in the prosperity of Eugene and
Lane county, and everybody is glad
to hear that the lumber market has
so improved that the company has
seen fit to resume operations at Wen-
dling and to enlarge its great system of
mills.

**MINERS
GO OUT ON
A STRIKE**

The whole crew of men, between 40
and 50 in number, employed as min-
ers and some of the tramway men at
the Lucky Boy mine are out on a
strike, and President Louis Zimmer-
man is looking for men to fill their
places.

As told the Guard, the cause of the
strike is as follows: For some time
past there has been considerable com-
plaint about the food furnished the
miners. The other day one of the
men registered a kick about a piece of
meat given him and it is said used
abusive language toward the cook's
wife. The woman flew into a rage and
threw the meat in the miner's face,
whereupon they all quit.

It is said that operations will not
be discontinued on account of the
strike and that the necessary men to
fill the strikers' places will be easily
obtained.
