HOLDUP MAN AT GOLD HILL

Man Wanted at Eugene Believed to Be Going South

Lone Highwayman With Blue
Mosquito Bar Over Face Held
up Saloon at Gold Hill
Last Night

Last night Sheriff Fisk and Police-
men Croner and Pratt went to the
room of a man in the Matlock lodging
house, and after awakening him gave
him a "sweat-box" examination, and
also examined the contents of his
room, thinking that he might have
been the much looked for "hold-up"
man. His description tallied as to
weight, height and build, and also as
to the color of his hair. However,
the Hoffman House night el k who
was held up failed to identify the
man and believes that the man that
held him up had shorter hair than the
suspect.

Sheriff Fisk this morning received
notice that on Wednesday night at 11
o'clock a saloon was held up at Gold
Hill, in Southern Oregon, by a lone
highwayman. The "hold-up man"
had a mask of blue mosquito bar, the
same as the man that held up the
Hoffman House and also the store at
Springfield on Monday night, and the
description as to height, weight and
color of hair is the same. The simi-
larity of the man in height, weight,
color of hair and the further fact that
in each case the highwayman wore a
blue mask made of mosquito bar leads
the officers here to believe that the
fellow held up the Springfield store
on Monday night, the Hoffman House
on Tuesday night at one o'clock, at-
terwards shooting Night Watchman
Farrington in order to make his get-
away, and then took the southbound
train a few minutes thereafter. The
officers were busy caring for Farring-
ton, hence did not make the train go-
ing out soon after the shooting, and
the bandit could have easily made his
escape on this train and have made
Gold Hill and held up the saloon
thereon Wednesday night.
