 BUILDING**

John Davies, the retired tailor and shop grocer, has purchased from Hobb, M. Pratt the two-story brick block occupied by E. D. Matlock's general store and the Barker Gun Works on East Ninth street, the purchase price being \$2500.

The deal, which had been pending for some time, was consummated late Saturday afternoon. The Guard had known of the deal for a week or more, but by request refrained from giving publicity to it until it had been completed.

The building is 40x80 feet in dimensions, and the lot on which it stands extends from East Ninth street to Park street, being 100 feet deep.

Mr. Davies intends to remodel the building, and will divide the second floor, which is now used for a workshop and a warehouse, into lodging rooms.

The residence property of Mr. Pratt at West Sixth and Lawrence streets has also been purchased by Mr. Davies.
