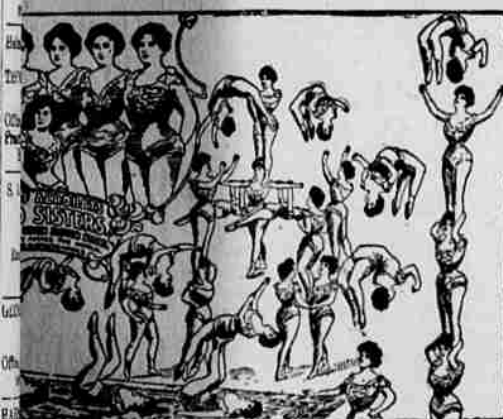

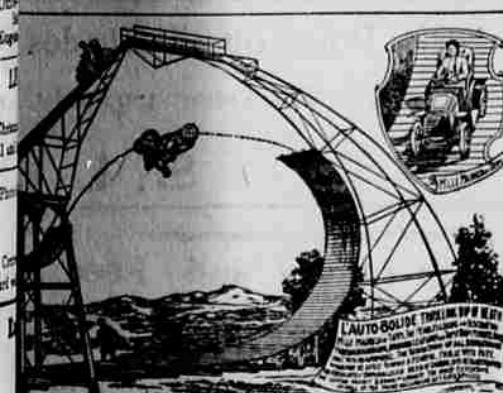

SIGHTS SEEN BEHIND SCENES

How Circus Elephant Limp After Being Wounded Till Trainer Rubs Injured Member

If any one doubts that animals, or
come of them at least, have imagi-
nation, they should watch the little el-
ephants that appear in the battle
scene during the performance of the
Barnum and Bailey circus. This is
one of the most remarkable trained
elephant acts ever seen and never
fails to evoke a great deal of applause.
There are eight little Singapore el-
ephants in the herd, and they give a
realistic representation of a battle in
India, marching, counter-marching,
advancing, retreating, firing cannon,
simulating injury and death, and
dualy when the captain, impersonated
by the trainer, falls apparently
with a mortal wound, two of the el-
ephants pick him up, and preceded by
an elephant bearing a flag of truce,
carry the injured officer out of the
ring, down the track and into a place
of safety. Those who have seen this
act in New York marveled at the in-
telligence of these strange beasts, won-
dered at the patient persistence that
made their training possible, and you
rub your eyes and question whether,
after all, it is not a dream—a figment
of the imagination.

The real climax of this act is never
seen by the audience. It occurs down
in the basement of the elephant cor-
ral. In the performance the elephant
that carries the flag of truce has ap-
parently been wounded, and he hob-
bles away on three legs. One foot is
held high in the air. Instead of drop-
ping it, however, as soon as he reach-
es the door of the "green room," the
elephant continues to lobble on three
legs until he reaches the corral.
Even there he does not drop his
"wounded" leg until his trainer, H.
J. Mooney, speaks soothingly and
rubs the "injured" member.

"He really thinks he has been
shot," says Trainer Mooney, "and if
I didn't rub his leg he would hold it
up all night."

The trained elephants will attract a
great deal of attention when the big
show is here next Friday, August 25.
One performance. Doors open at 12,
begins at 1 o'clock sharp.
