Southern Pacific."

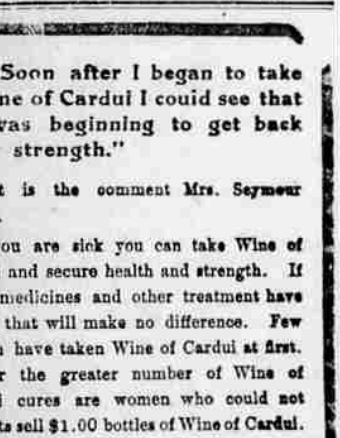

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FAMOUS SALEM BEER

INJURY CAUSED DEATH

Frank Dixon, Unknown, Expired at the Hospi- tal Today

Was Struck on the Head by a Falling Limb of a Tree in a Logging Camp Fri- day

Frank Dixon, a young logger, em-
ployed for some time past in Button
& Kenning's camp on the upper Mo-
hawk, died at the Eugene hospital
this forenoon at 11 o'clock as a re-
sult of injuries received Friday.

The young man was struck on the
head by a falling limb of a tree and
rendered unconscious. He remained
in that condition to the last.

No one seems to know anything
about the unfortunate young man.
He never told his fellow workers
where he came from nor where his re-
latives are. Undertaker Gordon, who
has the body at his morgue, will hold
it a day or two in hopes that in some
manner the news of his death may
reach his relatives. Funeral arrange-
ments have not yet been made.

HIGH SCHOOL FOR FLORENCE

At Special Election Voters De- cide in Favor of Upper Grades

A special meeting of the electors
of the Florence school district was
held at the school house Monday af-
ternoon to submit to the legal voter
the question of adding the ninth and
tenth grades of the public school in
this district.

The vote was taken under the super-
vision of the school board, of whom
Directors Kyle and Shrum were pre-
sent, while E. A. Pickle, district clerk,
performed the duties of clerk of the
election.

Voting commenced soon after two
o'clock and continued until four,
when the polls were closed, 29 citizens
having deposited their tickets in the
ballot box.

The votes being counted, it was
found that 17 were in favor of the
high school and 12 were opposed.—
The West.

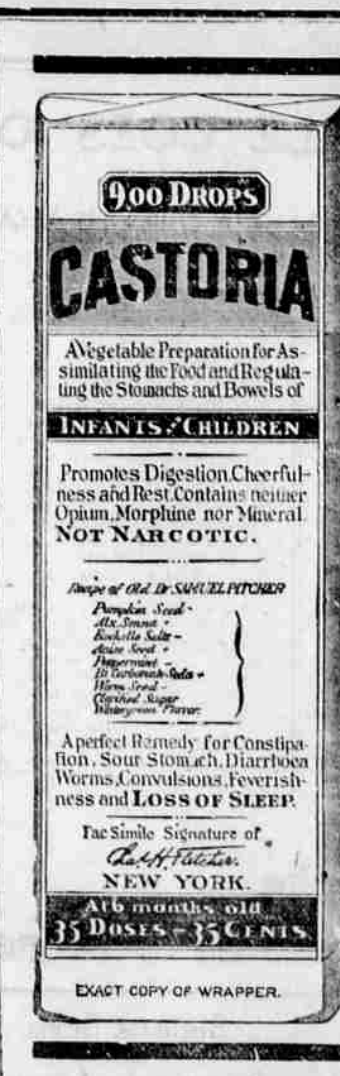
