S. P. WILL PAY ON \$12,000 A MILE

In Josephine County—Assessor
Fallin Has Doubled the Assessment Roll

County Assessor W. H. Fallin has completed the field work of making up the assessment roll of Josephine county for 1905. While no totals have been made, Mr. Fallin is confident the roll will foot up over \$4,000,000. For 1904 the roll was \$2,034,945, and this year's roll will be double that of last year, says the Ashland Record.

Farm lands were rated according to their value and timber land entered as such is assessed at \$7 an acre. Railroad land assessed last year at \$1.50 and \$2.50 per acre, is valued this year at \$3 and \$5 an acre.

The Southern Pacific will now pay taxes on \$12,000 a mile on its 37 miles of road in Josephine county, instead of \$5000 a mile, the valuation last year. The railroad company put in their rolling stock at \$400 a mile, the same as last year. In making their valuations they put locomotives at \$2000 each, passenger cars at \$1400, stock cars at \$110, box cars \$105 and flat cars at \$70 each. As these valuations are less than a fourth of the worth of such rolling stock, Assessor Fallin put the company on the roll for \$1000 a mile for its rolling stock.

The Western Union Telegraph Company was assessed last year on its lines and office equipment in Josephine county at \$3945; while this year the company will pay on \$10,950. The Pacific Postal Telegraph Company paid on \$1020 last year, but this year will pay on \$7950. The Pacific States Telephone Company was on the roll last year for \$4570, and this year for \$13,500.

WORK ON BIG RAILROAD BRIDGE

Nothing sensational has happened this week in the way of railroad news. Everything is moving along smoothly with a large force of men at work getting the ground ready for the east pier, which will be the first one built. The pile driver and donkey engine have been hauled to the bank of the river and made ready for immediate use. The preliminaries are nearly all finished and work will commence in dead earnest within a few days.—Springfield News.

UNIVERSITY FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

Ten of Last Year's Team
Will Be Here
Again

McKinney, Friessell and Moulton
Will Be Valuable Additions
to the Team—Schedule of
Games

Although the opening of the football season is a month away, the 'varsity' football enthusiasts are already darning on the probable strength of Oregon's eleven. That the supply of available candidates will be larger than ever this year seems to be a foregone conclusion, and unless something unforeseen occurs Coach Shorts should turn out a stronger aggregation than the champion team of last year.

To begin with, Oregon will have ten of last year's veterans in the harness again, almost the entire list of substitutes and second-team men. A few of the latter stand a fair chance to crowd out some of the veterans for cherished positions, for Shorts will pick his team from the best of the candidates, irrespective of their previous records.

The fact that McKinney, the big fellow who played tackle in 1902 and 1903, will be in college again is causing great glee among the followers of the gridiron game. McKinney weighs over 200 pounds, is quick and active, and bids fair to add considerable strength to the team.

Conspicuous among the new men who will try for the team is Friessell, who played for three years with the University of Nevada. Friessell has the reputation of being the best punter and one of the best halfbacks west of the Rockies, the California experts selecting him as halfback for the all-coast team in 1903 and 1904. Moulton, a San Francisco high school boy, whose family recently moved to Eugene, is another new man on whom the collegians are counting. He weighs 180 pounds, plays guard and tackle, and is a sure place-kicker. Manager Stelwer says that there will be several crack high school players in the incoming freshman class, and that he is preparing to equip 50 candidates. Captain Latourette and most of his football men will be in Eugene by September 25, although college will not open until two days later.

Coach Shorts is due on September 20, and after a few days of preliminary practice hard work will be in order. The season's schedule, although not yet completed, stands as follows:

September 30—Oregon vs. Alumni, at Eugene.

October 7 (or 14)—Oregon vs. Stanford, at Palo Alto.

October 11—Oregon vs. California at Berkeley.

October 21, 28, and Nov. 4—Open dates.

November 11—Oregon vs. Williamette, at Salem.

November 18—Oregon vs. Washington, at Seattle.

November 24—Oregon vs. Agricultural College at Eugene.

November 30—Oregon vs. Multnomah, at Portland.

Well Informed Railroad Man Thinks

Southern Pacific Surveying

for a Line Over the Cas-

cades

A well-informed railroad man who

has been in Eugene for some time past

and who keeps thoroughly in touch

with every movement made by the

big railroad concerns looking to the

construction of new lines, was inter-

viewed today in regard to the crew of

the "Oregon Eastern" railroad survey-

ors who arrived here Saturday after-

noon from San Francisco and began

work at Natron this morning.

The railroad man, whose name is

withheld by request, stated that from

the fact that the surveyors are work-

ing from Natron he is of the opinion

that they are in the employ of the

Southern Pacific Co. instead of the

Gould interests, as the latter intend

to reach the valley via the McKenzie

Pass. However, he says, the Gould

people might have recently changed

their plans and decided to come over

the Military wagon road route, or they

may make surveys of both routes

to ascertain which is the best.

Another fact that makes it look

like a Southern Pacific move is that

the surveyors came from San Fran-

cisco, but it is said that the Gould

lines have for some time past been

hiring old S. P. surveyors and it may

be that this crew was formerly in the

Southern's employ, but were hired by

the Goulds.

If these surveyors are working for

the Southern Pacific it means that the

Harriman people are contemplating

a line into Eastern Oregon

to head off the Goulds, who have been

considering this project for some time

past.

Whichever company builds across

the mountains Eugene will be on an-

other trans-continental line. If it is

the Southern Pacific the train will

use the Woodburn-Natron branch

from Natron to Springfield, cross the

river on the new cutoff to Henderson,

thence down the main line to Port-

land.
