NEW INSTRUCTOR IN ECONOMICS

University of Oregon Secures an
Eastern Man to Take the
Chair

The place in economics recently
made vacant at the University of Ore-
gon by the resignation of Walter L.
Whitless, who occupied the position
and who is now holding a similar po-
sition at Cornell, has been filled by
the appointment of Professor Will V.
Pooley to the position as instructor
for the coming year. Mr. Pooley is a
graduate of the University of Wiscon-
sin, class of '05, and comes highly
recommended. He has had experi-
ence in teaching, he having formerly
held a position in the Galena,
Illinois, high school. He will ar-
rive in Eugene before the opening of
school, so as to familiarize himself
with the conditions and work here.
It is expected that the class in econ-
omics will be very large this year,
and the work done will be of the best.
