Anxious to See the Bad

Of the first production of "Mrs. Warren's Profession" in New York—the English play that was thereupon suppressed because of its nastiness—the New York Journal says:

"George Bernard Shaw's much-exploited play, 'Mrs. Warren's Profession,' was produced at the Garrick theatre last night without police interference, but incidental to the initial production of the comedy in New York there was enacted one of the most remarkable scenes ever witnessed outside a New York theatre.

"The police reserves had to be called out in order to keep in order a mob, mostly women, who clamored about the box office for seats for the performance. Women came singly and in groups of two and three. A woman escorted by a man was an exception in the crowd. Men were greatly in the minority.

"As early as 7 o'clock the women began to arrive, and thence on until after 9 o'clock they lingered about the theatre, demanding seats, when no more were to be had, and conducting themselves in such an objectionable manner that the police finally had to be invoked to clear out the lobby.

"Long before 6 o'clock practically every seat in the house was sold. In some way speculators got hold of many of the choice seats and an hour before the performance began a pair of seats in the orchestra circle sold for \$50. Thirty dollars was the price asked for single seats and general admission tickets went, while they lasted, at \$5.

"When the curtain went up the box office reported that at least twenty-five hundred people had been turned away.

"Outside several hundred of these still stormed the doors, acting like women at a bargain sale."
