### Seduction Case Occupied Court's Attention Today

Tony Bryant Found Not Guilty by the Jury--Jess Eddy Will Enter Plea Tomorrow

The circuit court has been busy today with the case of the State vs. Neil Cummins, charged with seduction under promise of marriage. The personnel of the jury in the case is as follows: D. Hill, H. Yates, Enos Harpole, A. E. Pickle, J. M. Kitchen, E. F. Chapman, F. Renne, S. B. Mayben, Dave Allison, W. H. Kay, J. J. Dickey and H. E. Rice. The prosecuting witness, Miss Mary Daniels, of Cottage Grove, was on the stand all forenoon. Only a very short time ago she gave birth to a child and she claims that Cummins is its father and that he had promised to marry her. The case was still on trial at a late hour this afternoon.

**BRYANT NOT GUILTY.**  
The jury in the case of the State vs. Tony Bryant, charged with rape, late Saturday afternoon returned a verdict of not guilty. Jesse Eddy was arraigned this forenoon on the charge of robbery and tomorrow at 9 a. m. was the time set for entering his plea. This will be his second trial, the supreme court having remanded the case back to the circuit court.

## NEW MILL FOR COTTAGE GROVE

Cottage Grove correspondence: A secret movement has been underway here for some time, the object of which only became apparent recently by a man, putting ten teams and cranes at work removing the soil from a six-acre tract to make a pond. The force will be increased with ten more teams.

A large sawmill is to be erected at the edge of this pond, and the pond will be used for storing the logs, of which it will hold over 1,000,000 feet. Logs will be brought in over the Oregon & Southeastern from the large timber section on the low river. The men behind this movement are well-to-do business men, and the establishment of this plant will not be retarded for lack of funds.

As soon as the large foundation timbers can be furnished, the erection of the mill will commence. The mill will be on the J. I. James farm, adjoining the city limits.
