MITCHELL RESIGNS POSITION

Of Chairmanship of Committee on Inter- oceanic Canals

**Says He Could Take no Part in
Work and Concluded This
Action Was Best— Re-
tains Senatorship**

Washington, Dec. 5.—The house re-solved into a committee of the whole and began the consideration of the Hepburn canal bill. Fairbanks re-ceived a letter from Mitchell, of Ore-gon, resigning his chairmanship of the senate committee on interoceanic canals. Millard will probably suc-ceed him.

Portland, Dec. 6.—"I came to the conclusion that as I couldn't take any part in the work of the isthmian com-mittee I had better resign, that's all there is to it," said Senator Mitchell today when asked his reasons for withdrawal.

CANADA FIGHTS OUR LUMBER

Washington, Dec. 6.—Special Agent Charles M. Pepper, of the Depart-ment of Commerce and Labor is just back from a tour of the Canadian Northwest. He says a movement is under way to secure a duty on Amer-ican rough lumber imported into Can-ada equal to that laid by the United States on Canadian lumber imported into this country; that is, \$2 per thousand. If this fails, the aim is to obtain a tariff impost of some kind so that the lumber shipments, from Washington and Oregon may be brought within the provisions of the anti-dumping clause.

RAILROAD FREIGHT REGULATION

Washington, Dec. 6.—Representative Townsend introduced in the house today in an amended form the Each-Townsend bill, which passed the house last session. The bill still has the support of the administration. The bill today follows the lines of the last, making clearer the intention to include private refrigerator car lines. It increases the interstate commerce commission to seven members, with salary of \$10,000 each. It gives the commission power to declare and or-der a maximum freight rate. Appeal to the supreme court is provided for, also the inspection of books and ac-counts of railroads.

REMARKABLE DIV- ING BOAT

Washington, Dec. 6.—Some time during the next six months at Seat-tle, Washington, a remarkable outfit of machinery will be installed on the cable ship Burnside. The apparatus is designed to dive to the bottom of the ocean, even to the depth of one and a half miles, and bring a cable to the surface for repairs. The machin-ery is now being constructed by a firm in New London, Conn., and will cost about \$23,000.

THEY ARE ON THE RUN

New York, Dec. 6.—It is reported that McCall and Perkins will both re-tire.

On Fire for Sixteen Years

Butte, Mont., Dec. 5.—Fire in the St. Lawrence mine of the Amalgamated Copper Company, which has been kept under restraint for the past 16 years, broke through the cracks on the mine level last night, causing 25 mines to flee from the Mountainview mine, the adjoining property. Mines in the St. Lawrence mine were also forced to flee to the surface.

Roosevelt's Captain Is Dead

New York, Dec. 5.—Woodbury Kane, clubman and society leader, also cap-tain of Roosevelt's regiment, is dead. He married the divorced wife of Duncan Elliott.

Mrs. Berry Holds the Car
Glard, Kan., Dec. 5.—Mayor Bar-nett today swore out a warrant charg-ing Mrs. Berry, who still holds the car. Officers will starve her out.

The Sultan is Willing
Constantinople Dec. 5.—The sul-tan, with minor reservations, has agreed to the powers' demands for the financial administration of Macedonia.

Exclude Japanese and Koreans

Washington, Dec. 5.—The Califor-nia delegation in the senate and house held a meeting today and agreed on a bill for the exclusion of Japanese and Koreans. The bill will extend all of the laws now in force in the United States and its territories excluding Chinese laborers to the Japs and Ko-reans.

BRITAIN'S NEW PREMIER

London, Dec. 5.—After a conference of an hour this morning with the king Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman accepted the position of premier and agreed to form a new cabinet. Before going to the palace Campbell-Bannerman received a visit from the Duke of Devonshire and Unionists in behalf of free trade. It is believed if Bannerman has allied himself with the Duke of Devonshire that home rule will be sidetracked for the tariff, and for a while free trade will be the paramount issue with the new min-istry. Chamberlain says he is pleased with Campbell-Bannerman's accep-tance.

MURDERER HANGED THIS MORNING

Elk River, Minn., Dec. 5.—El. D. Crawford, convicted of the murder of Helma Dandin in a box car, was hanged at 1:43 this morning. He died bravely, refusing to reveal his identity, but to his spiritual adviser said: "My father is worth hundreds of thousands of dollars, my mother is a social queen and my sister is engaged to a wealthy Easterner. I could have had money for defense, but re-fused. My family did not know of the case. They believed I was wandering. I ran away from my folks, who have not heard from me since." Crawford said he did wrong, but was ready to die.

Pendleton, Or., Dec. 4.—Boyd Red-ner, the night clerk at the local ex-press office, who skipped with \$100 in gold and was brought back to Pen-dleton today from Chicago, was taken before Judge Ellis this afternoon. According to his story he went from Walla Walla to Seattle, there became drunk and lost nearly all the money he had. He asserts that he was drugged and when he awoke was on board a train with a ticket for Chic-go. When arrested he had but \$19 in his pocket. He entered a plea of guilty and was given three years in the penitentiary.
