CHRISTMAS GAME CALLED OFF
Faculty Objected and All Oregon Team Will Not Play

Owing to an objection by the University of Oregon faculty, the All-Oregon-Multnomah game for Christmas at Portland, has been called off, and instead the Multnomah team will have a match with an all-star team from Salem.

Managers Stelwer and Watkins came to an understanding yesterday. The faculty was opposed to the game, and while it did not absolutely prohibit the game it was thought better to change the plans. Several of Oregon's best men, including Chandler, Arnsperger and Latourette, wouldn't have played, and it was hard to induce the alumni players to get into uniform. Dick Smith would not have played, and altogether the arrangements are satisfactory. A contract for this game was made early in the season, and Manager Stelwer has been trying to call it off for some time, but the Multnomah management has heretofore refused to cancel the game.

The college football season ends with Thanksgiving day, and it is very inconvenient to keep the players in training till Christmas time.

U. O. CLASSES WILL BE DISMISSED

Several Mild Cases of Smallpox at the Dormitory

Faculty Thinks Best Dismiss Classes Till After Holidays—Every Precaution Taken To Prevent a Spread

It is probable that beginning tomorrow the classes at the University of Oregon will be dismissed until after the Christmas holidays. This action will no doubt be taken at a meeting of the faculty tomorrow morning. The cause of this is the existence of four very light cases of smallpox in the dormitory. The dormitory has been quarantined and there is no great danger of the disease spreading among the students, but inasmuch as the holidays are so close at hand it was deemed advisable to dismiss the classes now.

While the students are away every room in all the buildings on the campus will be thoroughly fumigated and it is expected that by the time the classes are again taken up the students who are now afflicted will be entirely recovered.

President Campbell is urging all the students to be vaccinated and thus assist materially in preventing the spread of the disease. Every precaution will be taken to eliminate all traces of the disease during the holidays and when the students return they will have no fear of contracting it.

While it is unfortunate that smallpox has broken out among the students and a week's time will be lost, President Campbell and the members of the faculty are not worrying over the matter. They are confident of successfully coping with the contagion. The president advises the students who live at a distance to remain in Eugene for a few days in order that the germs of the disease may not be carried to the several homes of those who might have become exposed.

The physicians in attendance upon the students who are afflicted state that the disease is in a very mild form and none of them are very ill. The names of the students are Arnsperger, Hammock, Fountain and Cleveland.
