FINANCIAL RUIN IS IMMINENT

Russian Strikes Have Reached Proportions of Civil War

Many Laying in Supplies to Fortify Against Long Siege--Revolutionists Wrecked Train Near Riga

St. Petersburg, Dec. 21.—A strike of all Russia is beginning with great rapidity, and workmen are showing perfect discipline under their leaders. There is an indescribable panic among people generally, a feeling that this is the opening of the last act of the national tragedy, and will result in either the downfall of the government or victory for the anarchy. It has reached almost the proportions of a civil war, and it is

hardly proper to call the movement here a mere industrial strike.

Financial ruin of the country seems imminent. Many soldiers have been arrested while addressing the people in the streets, urging them to join the rebels. The prices of supplies are rising rapidly, and all are trying to secure a great amount of provisions to fortify against a long siege. The revolutionists wrecked a train near Riga, killing five soldiers and wounding twenty others.

San Francisco, Dec. 21.—Bob Fitzsimmons, ex-heavyweight champion of the world, was defeated in the thirtieth round by Jack O'Brien last night. At the end of the round Fitz went to his corner, and as he sat in his chair his head fell on his knees and he was unable to rise. Referee Gracey then awarded the fight to O'Brien, who out fought his opponent in every round.
