What Oregon Must Have

The people of Oregon should use good judgment in making nominations for congressmen. For 40 years the "bosses" have made the nominations and Oregon, from this system, has fallen till the men selected by this method, three of them, have been indicted by the federal grand jury, in two instances convicted, and the remaining senator ignored by the national administration.

Governor Chamberlain, through the death of Senator Mitchell, has given the state a senator who is in accord with the administration and there is no doubt that Senator Gearin will accomplish much for Oregon.

The people for the first time will nominate a congressman to succeed the bosses' choice, Binger Hermann. It is to be hoped the people will fall into no trap and not nominate a "stand pat" man who has always worked in harmony with the few bosses that have brought Oregon to its present disgraceful position. Both parties in this district have good, capable men, and nothing else will do for the state. The man who represents this district should be a man above a single word of reproach, morally, financially or otherwise. As soon as any new congressman is elected his record will be scanned and his history will be an open book to the powers that be at the national capital.

This district must send a gilt-edged man to congress if we desire results, and the people must first investigate for themselves and learn not to vote for this nomination because some spellbinder puts himself on the back and says: "I am it, the only 'it' in Oregon. I have always stood by the 'ring' that has brought Oregon to its present position. I have stood by them through thick and thin. I stand by the president, by the senators, by the people. I'll stand for anything you want if you will just vote for 'it'."

The Albany Herald says editorially: Eugene reports that smallpox is stamped out. What promise to be a serious outbreak of this disease has yielded to prompt and scientific measures and the university may open, it seems, as announced. All contagious diseases, however mild, should be subjected to strict regulation.

EXCURSION TO CALIFORNIA

Under Auspices of the Oregon Development League Leaves Portland on Special Train January 13

Secretary Tom Richardson, of the Oregon Development League, is very desirous that the state at large should be well represented on this excursion. The party, which will be composed of ladies and gentlemen, leaves Portland at midnight January 13, 1905, stops being made at Sacramento, San Francisco, Palo Alto, San Jose, Paso Robles, Santa Barbara and Los Angeles. Special entertainment will be accorded the party at these points. The rate from Portland will be \$53 for one person, which includes three meals to be served on dinner between Portland and Sacramento, and Pullman berth to Los Angeles. A rate of \$58 will be charged where two people occupy a double berth. A deposit of \$25 is necessary on each ticket to secure reservation. Section reservations will be held until December 25th. This is an excellent opportunity to visit California, as the auspices under which it is given insures a most enjoyable outing.

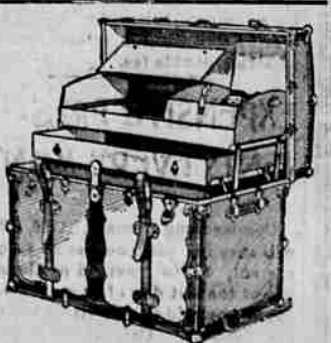
