ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING

Members of Christian Church Hear Reading of Reports

Net Gain in Membership During Past Year 157—A Total of 830 Members at Present Time

The annual business meeting of the First Christian church of Eugene was held on Monday evening and reports were made from all departments of church work.
The reports showed that the church has prospered during the year 1905 more than any year since the present pastor, Rev. J. S. McCallum, took charge of the work. During the year 192 were added to the membership. There were three deaths and letters were granted to 32, leaving a net gain to the membership of 157. The full enrollment today is 830.
The financial report showed that \$4 37.71 was raised for all purposes

BOND ELECTION IS ON

The election to determine a second time whether or not the city of Eugene shall issue bonds to raise \$200,000 for municipal water and electric light plants is on today and the result will be known some time between now and ten o'clock tonight.

There are four polling places this time instead of one, as before, and the vote appears to be heavier than at the previous election.

Advocates of municipal ownership and those who oppose it are lined up and working hard. While the Guard opposes municipal ownership under present conditions, it predicts that the bonds will carry, but not by such an overwhelming majority as at the first election. In fact, the Guard expects the vote to be close. While the bonds may carry, it is predicted by this paper that the plants will never be erected. Litigation will begin and probably result in the abandonment of the enterprise. In the meantime the Rhodes, Sinkler & Butcher representatives will go ahead with their plans and give Eugene first-class light and water service and electric railways and spend hundreds of thousands of dollars in the city and surrounding country.
