FALSEWORK WASHED AWAY

High Water Delays the Work on Springfield Bridge

Half of the Temporary Bridge Went Out Sunday Morning—Railroad Company Says Go Ahead

falsework washed away
Early Sunday morning that portion of the falsework of the big railroad bridge across the Willamette at Springfield between the caisson in the middle of the river and the west bank was washed away by the high water, entailing a loss of perhaps several thousand dollars and delaying the work on the bridge several weeks. For a week or more before the falsework went out the river had been steadily rising on account of the heavy rains, and it was predicted by many that the temporary structure would be swept away. The prediction came true Sunday morning, when the water rose to a height of over a foot above the work. The falsework of piling resting on the rock bottom of the river supported 12x12 timbers bolted together.

WILL NOT STOP.
It is reported that C. S. Freeland, the engineer in charge of the work of building the bridge, upon wiring the news of the loss of the falsework to S. P. headquarters and suggesting a postponement of operations until spring, received a reply to go ahead with the work anyway, doing the best he can.

The company has sent a new man to Springfield to assist in superintending the work on the bridge, and he is now at the scene of operations. His name is not learned. It is said that he is the best man for that work on the coast.

FOUR NEW CITIZENS IN 1905

That Many Naturalization Papers by County Clerk—Seventeen First Papers

During the past year County Clerk Lee has granted United States citizenship papers to four men of foreign birth and the first papers, or declaration of intention to become citizens, to seventeen.

Of the newly made citizens three are from Denmark and one from Germany. Of those who have made application to become citizens seven are subjects of the king of England, four are from Sweden, three from Denmark, and one each from Germany, Austria and Norway.
