IMPROVE OREGON COAST HARBORS

Siuslaw River Included in Bill to Be Introduced by Fulton and Gearin

A press dispatch from Washington, D. C., says: Senators Fulton and Gearin have decided to introduce bills, when Congress convenes, authorizing appropriations for all important rivers and harbors of Oregon, shaping the amounts by the recommendations and estimates of the army engineers. The bills have not yet been drawn, and the amount of the respective appropriations has not yet been decided, but the bills will provide for the improvement of Coos Bay, Tillamook harbor, Yaquina Bay, Siuslaw river, the continuation of the work on the Dalles-Celilo canal, the upper Willamette and lower Willamette, and the Columbia below Portland. The mouth of the Columbia has already been under consideration, and it will continue to receive first consideration.

The reason for the extra length of this session is the large amount of work which has to be done. It includes the appointment of road supervisors for each district, the judges and clerks of election, five for each of the fifty precincts, and the circuit court jurors for the year.

FLORENCE WILL HAVE LIBRARY

Many Small Towns May Obtain Books for a Small Sum

A press dispatch from Salem says: The people of Florence, Lane county, have raised \$50 to purchase a circulating library, and have forwarded the amount to the state library commission. This entitles Florence to the use of a circulating library as long as the state continues this work.

It will give it the use of about 150 books a year. Quite a number of the smaller towns have signified their intention of purchasing libraries. Dallas has already done so. By this means the number of libraries can be rapidly increased.

Most interior towns can, the authorities say, by means of public entertainments, raise sufficient means to purchase the libraries, and when it is understood that this will entitle them to the use of the circulating libraries, it is expected many more towns will join in the movement.
