WAS ON WRECKED STEAMER PORTLAND

E. E. Emmons, of Dawson, Now Visiting Here, Tells of Exciting Experience

E. E. Emmons, of Dawson, N. W. T., who arrived here yesterday to join his wife, who has been visiting relatives for some time, was on the steamer Portland when that vessel ran on the rocks and was wrecked a few days ago.

Mr. Emmons tells of some exciting experiences at the time of the wreck. The vessel was carrying no search lights at this time and on this account missed one of the buoys and as a result the ship smashed into a sharp rock a few feet below the surface of the water and listed badly to one side. The passengers, 120 in number, were compelled to wait till daylight before they could be taken ashore, and were in constant danger of being drowned, as it was feared that the vessel would slide off the rock and sink in 20 fathoms of water.

ELECTRIC LIGHT BONDS DEFEATED

But Water Bonds Carried by Small Vote

Vote Show: Great Revolution in Opinion of Voters on Bonding Question Since Last September

The Guard's contention that since the election in September when electric light and water bonds carried by a vote of three to one, there has been a great revolution in the opinion of the taxpayers of the city on this question was verified at the special election yesterday, when the electric light bonds were defeated by 51 votes and the water bonds carried by only 8 votes.

A much larger vote than at the September election was polled and both sides worked strenuously, many persons being persuaded to go to the polls who otherwise would not have thought of it.

VOTE BY WARDS.

First Ward—For light bonds, 219; against, 132; majority for, 87.

Second Ward—For light bonds, 85; against, 140; majority against, 51.

Third Ward—For light bonds, 93; against, 132; majority against, 39.

Fourth ward—For light bonds, 90; against, 135; majority against, 49.

First Ward—For water bonds, 221; against, 119; majority for, 105.

Second ward—For water bonds, 85; against, 130; majority against, 45.

Third ward—For water bonds, 98; against, 126; majority against, 28.

Fourth Ward—For water bonds, 93; against, 117; majority against, 24.

Total for light bonds, 488; against, 539; majority against, 51.

Total for water bonds, 500; against, 492; majority for, 8.
