LANE COUNTY'S STATE TAX

Lane county's share of the state tax will be \$28,875 for 1906, as apportioned by the state board of tax apportionment. The total revenue required will be \$1,028,900.05, of which over \$150,000 is covered by surplus not applied and over \$277,000 miscellaneous receipts, leaving an even \$600,000 to be raised by apportionment among the counties.

BOY SHOT TO DEATH AT ACME

A telephone message to the Guard from Acme last night brought the news of a fatal accidental shooting there late yesterday afternoon. Frank Anderson, aged 10 years, stepson of J. Note, was shot in the abdomen with a shotgun in the hands of Paul Deane, aged about 14 years.

The Deane boy had been out hunting and on his return home met the Anderson boy. Young Deane, thinking that the shells had been extracted from the gun, playfully pointed the piece at the other boy and pulled the trigger. The full charge of birdshot entered his abdomen and the boy died two hours afterward.

FINE SOLDIERS' MONUMENT

Has Just Been Erected on the the G. A. R. Lot in the I. O. O. F. Cemetery

A fine monument for the soldiers who lost their lives in the war of the rebellion, 1861-65 and those who have died since has been erected on the G. A. R. lot in the I. O. O. F. cemetery by E. C. Lake, which exceeds anything of the kind in Lane county, and the old vets can point to it with pride.

It is 18 or 20 feet high. The figure of a soldier 7 feet high, with gun and standing at parade rest, surmounts the top, facing the west.

The trustees mentioned in the will of Comrade J. S. Corvel, which provided for the monument, are Comrades John Ingham, E. Wheeler and H. D. Wiley, and they should receive the applause of all living veterans for their good judgment and taste in fixing up their plot in the cemetery.

It is to be hoped that the above named comrades will set a day for the unveiling and dedication of the monument and invite the post and auxiliary orders, together with the citizens of our town, for their work is certainly complete and worthy and we should all feel proud of it.
