CHICAGO WOMAN MURDERED

Chicago, Jan. 6.—Mrs. Arthur W. Gentry, aged 26, redheaded, cultivated and bearing an excellent reputation among her neighbors, rushed into the office of Dr. David Dougherty, below her apartments at 522 LaSalle avenue, this morning and died in a few minutes from a wound in the throat. The janitor says that about the same time a man, supposed to be a roomer in the Gentry apartments, fled down the street toward the city.

The woman was the wife of the president of the Universal Trading Company. A blood stained razor was found in the hall. The couple were only married in September, the husband being a well-known artist. When he was notified he became hysterical. The police are looking for Frank J. Constantine, who had a room in the building. It is believed he tried to rob Mrs. Gentry or was repulsed in unwelcome advances.

RUSSIAN SITUATION TENSE

Factories Closed Till After Jan. 22 —Country Flooded With Depreciated Money

St. Petersburg, Jan. 6.—The financial condition of the country is extremely threatening. Paper money has been issued far in excess of ability to redeem. The only solution is the floating of a new loan, which is practically impossible while present conditions last. Every factory is closed on account of the holidays, employers generally deciding not to open until after the celebration of Red Sunday, January 22. Many stations along the Siberian railroad have been placed under martial law.

ALASKA-YUKON EXPOSITION

Wonderful Output of Gold for 1905—Shows Big Increase

Early Frost Cut Total Down But It Is Estimated the Frozen North Produced \$14,000,000

Washington, Jan. 6.—The Alaskan-Yukon exposition in Seattle in 1907 will mark the beginning of a new era in Alaska. That's what Consul Randall, of Dawson, Yukon, says officially to the department of commerce and labor of the exposition. He was reporting on the wonderful output of gold in Alaska during the year ending October 15, 1905, and the new era he speaks of is one in which he expects to see Alaska surpass Colorado and even California in gold production.

Despite early frosts, which cut short the crop, the value of the output for the past year is estimated at about \$14,000,000. The season previous it was about \$9,000,000, and the season before that only \$6,000,000. The output in the southeastern

"panhandle" and the Alexander archipelago is placed at a million and a half. Most of this came from the famous Treadwell quartz plants on Douglas Island.

Frosts held the Seward peninsula production down to \$1,500,000. Things have been booming as nowhere else in the Tanana valley, where \$6,500,000 was washed out. Fairbanks, the surprise of the season, has a strenuous rival town, bearing the name of Roosevelt.

In the next few years the consul expects to see the population of Alaska increase very rapidly and the wealth of this country doubled.

ICE COMPANY PRESIDENT SUICIDES

Chicago, Jan. 6.—The body of Jacob Rastman, aged 43, president of the Jefferson Ice Company, and wealthy, was found in the company's office this morning shot. A revolver was found near. The deceased's physician says Rastman the past year suffered losses aggregating several hundred thousand dollars due to the prosecution of the ice trust, and had told him he couldn't stand it longer. He claims the patient had been insane the past two weeks.

RUSSIA WILL GET NO LOAN

Paris, Jan. 6.—It is reported that the conference of Kokovzoff, the former Russian minister of finance, with Premier Rouvier in regard to a Russian loan of 800,000 francs resulted unfavorable to Russia.

RAILROAD WRECK IN NEVADA

Fast Mail Train Went In to the Ditch Last Night

Several Persons Were Badly Injured and Traffic Delayed But Nobody Was Killed

Reno, Nev., Jan. 6.—Fast mail train number 9 went into a ditch at Harney at eleven o'clock last night while speeding across the Nevada desert to make up for lost time. Several persons were injured and traffic was blocked until a late hour this morning. None were killed, but the mail clerk is said to be fatally injured and two brakemen and Conductor Noble are reported slightly injured. The cause of the wreck is not known, but it was probably due to the spreading of rails. Wrecking trains and doctors were sent from Sparks, Winnemucca and Carlin and in a few hours the injured were being cared for and the line was being cleared.
