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FRED LONG KILLED

In An Accident at Fischer's Sawmill at Marcola

Caught Underneath Two Rolling Logs and Badly Crushed—Died a Few Hours Later

Fred Long, a young man employed at Fischer Bros.' sawmill at Marcola, was killed at that place last Saturday. The crew had been putting logs in the race and Long was down the embankment when two logs began to roll toward him. One of the proprietors of the mill saw the situation and called to Long to look out, but the warning came too late. The logs caught the unfortunate man, both passing over him and crushing his hips in a horrible manner. He was conscious and said: "This suffering is awful, awful. I wish it had done a good job and killed me." He died a few hours after the accident, bleeding to death.

Long came from Corvallis, where his parents and relatives reside. A brother came after he had passed away. The mill men shut down Monday and attended the funeral of the deceased. The body was interred at Marcola.
