PROSPECTING FOR COAL

Vein on the Old Owen Place Is Being Worked

Two Eugene Men Hopeful of Finding Coal in Paying Quantity Ten Miles From the City

C. F. Mitchell and Wilbur Zimmerman, of this city, have recently secured a two years' option on a tract of land on the old Owen place, now owned by a man named Hansen, ten miles southwest of Eugene, and have begun the work of prospecting for coal on the land. For years past there have been found surface cropings of coal on the land and five or six years ago a company of men began prospecting and ran a tunnel into the side of a hill for 20 or 30 feet, but dissensions among them arose and the work was abandoned. They went far enough, however, to find a pretty well defined vein of coal of fair quality.

Messrs. Mitchell and Zimmerman have gone to the top of the hill, about 400 feet from the tunnel, and are boring down to see if they can strike the vein from there. They express themselves as being very hopeful of success.

There is no reason why coal should not exist in large quantities in this vicinity. There are large coal mines on Coos Bay, to the south, in the Nehalem country and in Washington, to the north, and a good vein exists on the Wilhelm place, near Creswell, in this county. It is believed that if the necessary capital could be secured to push development work on the last named property, coal in vast quantities could be taken out.

FELL OFF OF BIG BRIDGE

Little Girl at Springfield Received Severe Injuries

While going home from school Wednesday evening the little 8-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Moore, of Springfield, met with an accident that may result fatally. She was walking across the big bridge with other little girls and as she came to the west approach one of her companions, who was a little in the rear, called to her. She turned to answer, at the same time walking backward. One of the top boards of the railing had been broken off several days ago, and was lying by the side of the approach. On this she caught her heel, throwing her over the railing to the ground, which was about 15 feet. She was picked up by men who were working on the S. P. bridge and taken to her home, and for nearly three hours was unconscious. The doctor was called and upon examination found that no bones were broken. Her spine was badly hurt and it is feared serious internal injuries may develop. —News.

UNIVERSITY TRACK TRAINER DELAYED

Preliminary Training Will Be in Hands of Older Men

Track Manager Winslow, of the U. O., has announced that all arrangements for preliminary track work are off because of the inability of Trainer Hayward to come north this month.

Hayward will leave for Eugene immediately after the Stanford-Berkeley meet April 24. It will be necessary to find some means of getting the men into condition before the trainer arrives.

It is probable that the track management will appoint several of the older, reliable and experienced athletes to direct the training until Hayward arrives.

Just at present there is some speculation as to who will be track captain for the coming season. The re-election of George W. Hug, the "variety" weight man, would give general satisfaction, as would also the choice of Gordon Moore, the sprinter and hurdler.

DEATH OF SAMUEL GEER, PIONEER

Samuel Geer died at the home of his son, Levi Geer, London, Lane county, Oregon, Tuesday, January 2, 1906, at the advanced age of 83 years, 2 months and 18 days.

Deceased was one of the sturdy pioneers of Lane county, having crossed the plains to Oregon in 1864. He settled in the Coast Fork country and the following spring bought the farm where he died, now owned by his son Levi.

In 1880 Mr. Geer, with his wife, removed to Moscow, Idaho. In 1892 Mrs. Geer died. Mr. Geer immediately commenced to arrange his business affairs for return to Oregon, and in 1895 came to make his home with his son.
