The lumber situation remains about the same. A number of different deals are slowly being worked out. Before making any definite statement the parties concerned want to get their deals all settled. That the Booth-Kelly people will operate at Cottage Grove seems definitely settled, but just where or what they will do is not known. That we will have at least two mills in operation before another winter is out at all unlikely. The high price of lumber and the freight rates now standing are a great hindrance, and the timber available around Cottage Grove is too valuable to long stand unused.

WIFE THREATENS TO KILL HIM

J. W. D. Rickman, Former Eugene Man, Sues for Divorce at Portland

Portland Journal: Fearing that his wife will kill him, as he alleges she has threatened to do, J. W. D. Rickman has begun a suit in the circuit court for a divorce from Daisy Rickman. He names in the filed complaint two occasions when his wife threatened to kill him. The couple were married at Eugene April 10, 1903, and Rickman declares that "since their marriage his wife has become addicted to liquor, and during the past six months she has been intoxicated at least three times a week, and continues to drink whenever the opportunity presents itself."

Rickman declares that on July 1, 1905, his wife assaulted him with a stick of wood and threatened to cut out his heart. On August 10 he states he was at home ill when his wife went out in the evening and did not return home until 1:30 a. m., and then he says she was intoxicated and assaulted and beat him, which attack "made him sick and sore." Rickman declares that his wife on December 5 assaulted him with a butcher knife and threatened to cut his throat.
