TIMBER AND MILL PURCHASE

J. H. Chambers Has Sold Dorena Sawmill and Large Tract of Timber

The Dorena sawmill plant and 1000 acres of first-class timber lands, owned by J. H. Chambers, above Cottage Grove, have just been purchased by Russell & Rogers Company, of San Francisco. The purchase price was \$50,000. The estimation of timber is between 35,000,000 and 40,000,000 feet. The new company will operate the plant to its full capacity. The logs are cut, sawed and conveyed to the docks at Dorena in a flume, and from there it is kiln-dried, dressed and shipped. The plant has been in operation about two years.
