The normal heat of the hen approaches very nearly that of the human body, while the hen's setting heat is for the body a raging fever that continued much beyond the setting period of the hen, twenty-one days, means death.

BUYS INTEREST IN LIVERY BUSINESS

C. P. Barnard Half Owner of Bangs' Stables and Stage Lines Again

C. P. Barnard, of Roseburg, last evening closed a deal with E. H. Bangs, of this city, whereby he purchases a half interest in the latter's extensive livery and stage business here, the sale to take effect on February 1. Mr. Barnard will remain in Roseburg until April 1, when he will remove to Eugene with his family. In the deal Mr. Bangs acquires his former home residence at West Ninth and Charnelton streets, which Mr. Barnard purchased two or three years ago. The latter, however, reserves the east 60 feet of the lot and will erect a handsome residence thereon.

Six of Mr. Barnard's horses will be brought here from Roseburg and new vehicles and other equipments will be added to the business here.

It will be remembered that about two years ago Mr. Barnard bought a half interest in Mr. Bang's business, but owing to his pressing business at Roseburg, sold out to his partner and returned to that city. He says he is glad to get back to Eugene again.
