FAIRMOUNT LIGHT QUESTION

Mr. Marsh Tells About Public Locations Meetings - Says System Should Be Obtained

Editor Board:—In your issue of January 11 there appeared an article under the head of "Fairmount waste ten are lights," which is rather misleading.

Last Saturday night, January 6, a chosen few met at the home of Mr. Flegel and under the name of the "East Eugene Improvement Club," passed resolutions fixing the number of lights and their location for this part of the city. Outside of those present not half a dozen knew of the meeting, and certainly they did not represent the sentiment of the majority of the people. There were but twelve there, some not voting, and of the twelve some have never paid a cent of tax and had barely lived here long enough to gain a residence.

Under such a condition it was deemed advisable to call a mass meeting at my store when nearly three times that number responded. The discussion centered on the one light which the club had fixed for Mr. Garrett's corner, which, it was the

sentiment should be fixed one block east, would leave Moss avenue without a light, also Orchard avenue. As is well known, there are many dark corners in Eugene that are not lighted because of improper location of lights.

Messrs. Welch and Hunter, of the electric light company, spoke at the mass meeting and Mr. Hunter suggested that if we only got one light to place it so it would form part of a perfect system. Now the light on Mr. Garrett's corner throws all possibility of the best arrangement out. We desired to guard against future councilmen locating lights on their own corners to the detriment of private citizens. Mr. Garrett flatly refuses to present a petition such as nine-tenths of the voters of Fairmount called for. Mr. Garrett must remember that he is the representative of the people and not of an individual club.

ELIJAH HILLS DIED AT JASPER

Pioneer of the Early Fifties Passed Away at 12 O'Clock Last Night

Elijah Hills, one of the early Lane county pioneers, having come across the plains to Oregon in the early 50s, died at his home near Jasper last night about midnight, at the age of about 75 years.

The deceased had been ill only about two days. On Wednesday he left the house and not returning for some time it was thought that he had gone to a neighbor's place. He was found several hours later lying unconscious on the ground in the barnyard. He was carried into the house and rapidly grew worse until death came.

The deceased was one of the best known pioneers of the county and an upright and honorable citizen. He was the brother of Cornelius Hills and an uncle of Jasper Hills, the well-known logging contractor.

The couple were married in December, 1903, and the plaintiff alleges that from that time on she received the harshest of treatment. U. O. NOT "RICH MAN'S" COLLEGE

Students Will Be Asked as to Their Finances

When They Register for the Second Semester—Many Students Working Way Through School

All sorts of peculiar and searching questions will be asked of the University students when they register for the second semester. President Campbell stated at the last assembly that the authorities wished to learn if any basis exists for the oft-repeated charge that this is a "rich man's college." "Frequently," said President Campbell, "it has come to my notice that the University of Oregon is spoken of as a place where no student or small means has any right to attend, as most of its students are declared to be the sons or daughters of comparatively wealthy people of the state. For this reason the argument is advanced that the State University should not be supported by the state, but by tuition fees from the students."

"This is a mistake. There are many students in this university who are working their way through college, and wherever it is possible, the university aids them in their purpose."

"It is also a fact that a student is looked upon with considerable admiration who is not afraid to get out and work for his education, and the university has various small positions reserved for students in needy circumstances."

"To see exactly if the charges have any foundation, and for other reasons when the students register again the second semester, which will be required this year for the first time, they will be asked several questions as to their finances and method of living while in college. Answers will not be compulsory, but all students who have no objections will help by adding the university in making an accurate statistical report of student conditions. To determine this the student will be asked how much money he receives a month, whether he works during summer or at college, what his living expenses are, what he spends for pleasure, and what his father's business condition is."

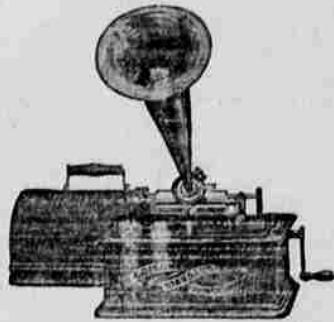
