Eugene patrons of the Pacific States Telephone Company were surprised to learn of the fact that the company is discriminating by making various rates to its patrons.

One Eugene business man said: "The Guard deserves great credit for this expose of the telephone people. I for one shall order the telephone service at my residence out and I hope all who are paying a toll of over \$1 a month will do the same." That is the way to give this monopoly a much-needed lesson.

WHAT COMPANY CLAIMS.

The company claims that this new rate made several years ago did not apply to old, original subscribers, but

in this it does not state facts, for recently the company has made as low as a \$1 rate to one of its new patrons. When it comes to facts, would a druggist, banker or any other business man give his goods to one customer cheaper than to another under similar conditions? If he did he would soon quit business.

The citizens of Eugene demand that the present company must give us just and equitable service and prices or suffer the consequences.

CONTRACT NOT A SECRET

It Is in Possession of City Attorney Bean

It Is Admitted That the Document was Never Submitted to the Council—Other Side's Opinion

The Guard is informed that the contract made between the fire and water committee and Engineers Kelsay and Reese for the sum of \$2000 is not now a secret. An official of the city stated today that the council had voted for the committee to make the necessary contracts with the engineers for surveys, etc. This, it is claimed, the committee did, and that they fully protected the city's interests and secured the services of an expert engineer at a reasonable price.

NOT SUBMITTED TO COUNCIL.

It is freely admitted that the contract was not submitted to the council, but this would have been done at the proper time. There was no intention of secrecy and it is stated that the document could be seen by the public at any time by calling at the city attorney's office. In fact, the mayor has had the document in his possession, which shows no secrecy was maintained.

THE OTHER SIDE.

It is stated by other members of the council that as the contract has been in existence nearly two months, and that as the fact of its existence only became known in the past few days it not having been properly submitted to the council, it is evident that it was a star chamber proceeding.
