

RESIDENT CAMPBELL'S REPORT

President P. L. Campbell, of the University of Oregon, went to Portland today to attend the annual meeting of the board of regents of the university tomorrow. He will read his annual report before the board. The report contains figures on enrollment of the institution as follows:

Total enrollment in all branches, 34, an increase of 34 over the enrollment of this time last year; at the college of letters in Eugene, exclusive of the department of music, 202, an increase of 21 over last year; at the law school 74, which is nearly double last year's enrollment; at the school of medicine, 82, considerable less than last year, and at the school of music,

FAIRMOUNT LIGHT CONTROVERSY

Councilman Garret Explains His Position and Connection with Location of Street Lights

Editor Guard:—In Friday evening's issue of the Guard our merchant, J. L. Marsh, of Fairmount, tried to make it appear that I ignored the wishes of the people in order to locate a light near my residence. This is misleading, to say the least.

The facts are, I never took any part in locating this or any other light either at a club meeting or otherwise. I did say, however, that I did not want any favors shown me in the locating of lights because I was in the council, as we are so often accused of being privileged creatures, you know. A petition signed by 40 residents (our J. L. Marsh's name included, but he later asked to have it erased) calling for five lights, one of which was located at my corner, was handed me to present to the council. It has been suggested to me that a councilman did not need light, and if his neighbors impose on him by locating light near him he should remove to some back alley. I may be relieved of this if Mr. Marsh is successful in his efforts.

Mr. Marsh says I flatly refused to present a petition, but he does not explain what that petition is. I have never seen it, but have been told it called for ten lights for Fairmount, which number I considered unreasonable at this time. A reporter asked me if I would support such a petition, and I said no for the above reason. Let us be fair and call for what is justly due us. I believe that five lights are all the fair-minded people of Fairmount expect at this time. And as to the locating of these lights my desire is that they be located where they will do the greatest good to the greatest number. Now as to my representing clubs, corporations or individuals, leave it to the people of Eugene to judge.

If Mr. Marsh succeeds in having a light located at his corner, which is generally recommended, I hope it will assist him to look a little way from home in such districts as Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets and others in this ward, where I am asked to assist in getting lights. After all, I think he will say his humble servant is doing his best to deal out justice in the different districts. And finally, when the lights are turned on peace will reign not only at Mr. Marsh's store, but in all parts of the city.
