OREGON PRESS ASSOCIATION

Twenty-First Meeting of the Editors—A Resume of Its Past Presidents

The Oregon Press Association completed its 21st session at Portland Saturday. The Telegram, one of the even twenty past presidents but one has passed to the beyond, is L. Campbell. We may add that he was a charter member, took great interest in its work, and never missed a meeting. We republish from the Telegram:

"Of the 20 past presidents of the Oregon Press Association having served since permanent organization was effected, in 1886, it is interesting to note that all, with one exception, are alive today; 12 are actively engaged in newspaper work, and ten were in attendance at the annual convention held last week. Prior to the year 1904 it had grown to be an old saying that 'to have been president of the Oregon Press Association was to live forever.' But the spell was broken over a year ago, when Ira L. Campbell, who served as president in 1892, died at his home in Eugene.

"The first president of the association was Martin L. Pipes, who was elected in 1886. He is now engaged in the practice of law in Portland. The second president, J. R. N. Bell, of Baker City, retired from newspaper work and entered the ministry. He has served as chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Masonry for the past twenty years. Charles Nickell, of Jacksonville, is still in the newspaper business, as is also A. Noltner, of Portland, the fifth president. L. Samuel, of Portland, is in the insurance business. James H. Eddy, the sixth president, is right-of-way agent for the Burrman railroad system. Ira L. Campbell, of Eugene, the seventh, is dead, and John H. Beagle, the eighth, is United States collector of customs for Alaska, stationed at Sitka.

"A. Noltner, the oldest member of the association in point of service, came to Oregon in 1852 when but 19 years of age. He has been actively engaged in newspaper work ever since, and is today connected with the Rural Spirit, published in this city. Besides being the first president of the association, Mr. Noltner conducted a newspaper in Eugene in partnership with Joseph Miller, the 'Giant Post of the Sierras,' during the civil war, which displayed such anti-Union tendencies that its publication was three times suppressed."
