Thought Dead Man Alive

That is a curious story that came from New York yesterday:
 "Ignorant of the fact that he had been dead for nearly two days, workmen made Charles Brady, an employe of the Consolidated Gas Company, the butt of jokes, while his lifeless form rested on a ladder at the house at 90 Washington street. He had been asphyxiated by gas while putting in a meter. His head and one hand were still in the small compartment and he appeared to be at work.
 "Say, old man," said Louis Bach, elevator man, who had seen Brady enter the building Saturday afternoon, "are you going to sleep over that job? You'd better get a move on you; the boss is after you."
 "John Woods tried to shove a piece of board under Brady's left foot as a joke. When Brady did not move the police were notified. It was found he was dead. His hand was firmly grasping a plug with which he opened a gas cock. From the open vent gas was pouring."
