Cigar manufacturers ask for light colored leaves for cigar wrappers. Cuban growers have had some success in meeting the demand by partially screening their fields with cheese cloth.

Our foreign trade in 1915 aggregated \$2,775,000,000, over half of which was represented by exports. If gold and silver be added to exports and imports of merchandise the total surpluses \$3,000,000,000. Internal commerce is estimated at something like \$6,400,000,000, which surpasses the previous year by \$250,000,000. The bank clearings passed those of 1914 by about \$30,000,000,000. Commercial failures were lighter than they have been for a number of years.

With so much selfishness on every hand—let our neighbors go to the devil if they have to—it does one's heart good the instance of the young man, Frank Edmiston, who unintentionally shot and severely wounded Lee Hoselt as they were hunting deer together, paying the considerable expenses of the wounded man. Schwab, steel magnate, who figured so prominently with Andrew Carnegie in the great Homestead works strike, in Pennsylvania, a few years ago, will shortly have his six-million-dollar cottage in New York ready for occupancy. "His," did we say? The people all over the country paid for it. And they are still paying unjust tribute to iron and steel manufacturers. Men are being constantly sent to penitentiaries all over the country for their ranging from the hundreds, even less, into the thousands, yet these iron barons who have been protected by law in stealing millions upon millions, wear the garb of respectability and pose as devout, philanthropic Christians. And they pour out from their millions in election times to gain immunity in and continuance of their stealings.

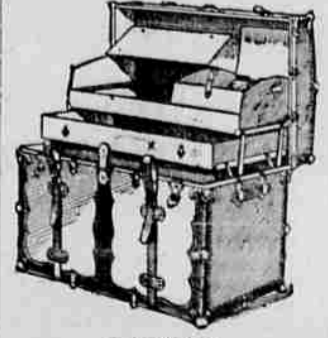
