Reporter Back of Folk

The following story by Hartley Davis in "Reporters of Today," in the February Everybody's, is probably more typical than most persons know: "The uncovering of the colossal municipal corruption in St. Louis and the civic revolution which has made Joseph W. Folk one of the most prominent men in public life, was primarily the work of a reporter, and this is true of most reform movements. James M. Galvin, who died in harness, in August, 1904, started the train which resulted in the tremendous upheaval. No man ever possessed a more remarkable or valuable news scent, and his resources of information ranged from the slums to the directors' rooms of banks, from the penitentiary to the cathedral. The great J. B. McCullough, managing editor of the Globe-Democrat, pronounced Galvin the best reporter he ever knew.

"Through the anger of the corrupt law-makers over the failure of the bribe to release it, Galvin learned of a great sum of 'boodle' deposited in a bank, protected by duplicate keys. His knowledge of municipal affairs, his marvelous acumen, his powers of deduction, coupled with his remarkable sources of information, enabled Galvin to get at the facts. But he had not a single proof. He sought District Attorney Folk and then printed a story with an oblique reference to a threat of a disappointed hoodler to lay the matter before the grand jury unless the money was released. Marked copies were sent to the magister and it frightened them so badly that they sought the Four Courts to save themselves by telling the whole story of the municipal rottenness. In the beginning of the crusade Mr. Folk worked under Galvin's direction, and the district attorney frankly gave the reporter the credit due him."
