VALENCIA SURVIVORS BROUGHT IN

Revenue Steamer Re-ports Ten Bodies on Beach

Eight of Men and Two Children. Heavy Surf Prevented the Government Boat Getting Them Off.

Seattle, Jan. 22.—The revenue steamer Grant has arrived here with ten survivors and the bodies from the Valencia. The bodies were taken to the morgue. Officers on the Grant report ten more bodies on the beach two miles from the scene of the wreck, but owing to the heavy surf were unable to bring them off. Eight of the bodies were men and two children.

A dispatch from Port Townsend is to the effect that a large sailing vessel is ashore on the west coast of Vancouver Island.

SUPREME COURT NEWS

The motion for a rehearing for former Assistant Postmaster General Beavers and companions, accused of postoffice frauds, was overruled.

GENERAL JOSEPH WHEELER BURIED

STRIKERS IN HUMBLE OIL FIELDS

They Plugged the Wells and Caused Great Loss

Derricks Swallowed up and Mud and Rocks Thrown Hundreds of Feet High into the Air

Houston, Texas, Jan. 22.—By a system of plugging oil wells this morning it is alleged Humble oil field strikers caused a series of volcanic disturbances, opening up craters that swallowed derricks and hurled fire, mud and rocks hundreds of feet into the air.

DENMARK'S KING DEAD

Copenhagen, Denmark, Jan. 22.—King Christian died suddenly here this afternoon in his 88th year. King Christian, the ninth of that name, was born April 18, 1818. He succeeded to the throne in 1863.

The king passed away quietly with only a few relatives present. Frederick, born in 1843, the father of Haskon VII, of Norway, will succeed immediately.

ATTEMPTS TO END HIS LIFE

James Drummond Cuts His Throat With a Razor

Had Lost His Job at the Coburg Sawmill and Thought to End His Troubles Occurred Sunday

James Drummond, aged 56 years and single, attempted to commit suicide by cutting his throat in his room at Mrs. Elliott's boarding house in Coburg about 8 o'clock Sunday evening.

Drummond had formerly been employed in the Booth Kelly sawmill at

Coburg, but was discharged a few days ago because of drunkenness. Last evening he ate a hearty supper and shortly afterward borrowed a razor, stating that he wanted to shave himself. He went to his room about 8 o'clock, and an hour afterward his roommate found him lying unconscious with a gaping wound in his throat. He had made an incision about five inches long, but it was not deep enough to result fatally. Dr. Jarnagin was called and dressed the wound.

The man was brought to Eugene late this afternoon and placed in the hospital. It is thought he will recover if no complications set in.

Drummond had been despondent since losing his job at the mill. He has lost several other places because of his drinking proclivities and is of a morose nature.

KEEP CLEAN AND PREVENT FEVER

At a meeting of the Lane County Medical Society Saturday evening the present typhoid fever epidemic was thoroughly discussed and it was concluded that in order to prevent the further spread of the disease the residents should boil the water used for cooking and drinking, pasteurize the milk if it is thought to be impure, do without fresh vegetables or thoroughly clean all that are used, keep flies from the food supply, clean up the back yards, connect toilets with the sewers.
