THE DRAIN-COOS BAY RAILROAD

Trains Will Be Running Within a Year—Construction to Begin in 60 Days

Within the next 60 days work on the Coos Bay branch of the Southern Pacific will be begun, and within a year trains are expected to be running into that long-neglected section of the state. The work will be let by the Harriman officials to contractors as soon as the steel and material are on the ground.

This is pouring into Drain, the point of divergence of the branch from the main line of the Southern Pacific, over 1000 tons of steel having already been received there from Eastern manufacturers. About 10,000 tons will be required to complete the new line, and the remainder will be received there within the next few weeks. Maps of the route to be followed by the line are now being perfected and rights of way secured. The Coast mountains will offer a barrier to easy construction, making numerous tunnels necessary. In line with the practice now followed by modern railroad builders, the road will be built with a few curves and grades as possible, regardless of the expense in cutting holes through through the sides of the mountains. Trestles will be avoided wherever hills can be made, and the management of the Southern Pacific will not spare expense in building a roadbed that will be first-class.

JOHN P. BARGER KILLED

In a Railroad Collision at Grant's Pass Last Evening

Was Fireman on Locomotive of Passenger Train Which Crashed Into Freight Train—Former Eugene Boy

John P. Barger, a well-known former Eugene boy, was killed in a railroad smashup at Grant's Pass last evening about 6 o'clock. He was fireman on one of the locomotives pulling the northbound passenger train. As the train pulled into Grant's Pass it crashed into the rear end of a freight train, badly damaging both locomotives of the passenger, demolishing the caboose and other cars of the freight train, badly injuring Engineer Crocker and killing Fireman Barger. Just before the arrival of the passenger the freight pulled in on a sidetrack. A drawhead pulled out, leaving a portion of the train on the main track and before the passenger train could be signalled there was a collision.

George and William Barger, brothers of the dead fireman, left here last night to bring the body here for burial.

John Preston Barger was born on a farm a few miles below Coburg October 15, 1871. Until he went to work as fireman for the S. P. Co., between five and six years ago, he had resided in Lane county all his life. About 15 years ago he began an apprenticeship as a printer in the office of the Oregon State Journal in this city and was foreman of the office when the city editor of the Guard began his apprenticeship about three years later. Seven or eight years ago he was employed for awhile in the Guard's composing room.

Being of a jovial disposition and of an upright character John won hosts of friends wherever he went and there in Eugene were greatly pained upon learning of his untimely end.
