PRESBYTERIANS

HOLD ANNUAL

MEETING

Reports Show Increase of Fifty-Nine Members During the Year

Church Is Free of Debt and Balance in Treasury—Pastor Mount Refuses Increase in Salary

The annual dinner and congregational meeting of the First Presbyterian church was held last night. The ladies of the congregation had provided a sumptuous repast to which over a hundred members of the church sat down.

Attorney S. D. Allen was chosen chairman to preside at the business session, at which time reports were received from all departments. The average attendance at the Sunday school was 108, 22 more than on the previous year. The Ladies' Aid Society and Missionary Society were reported in excellent condition.

The report of the elders showed the active membership of the church to be 235, of whom 53 were added to the church during the year. The treasurer's report showed all bills for current expenses met, with a slight balance in the treasury. It was proposed to increase the pastor's salary by \$200, but he declined the raise in view of the recent purchase of a new church lot, and the purpose of the church to erect a new building in the near future.

OFFICERS ELECTED.

D. F. Glover and W. W. Martin were elected elders for the ensuing period of three years. George Dixon was re-elected trustee for a period of three years. S. B. Eakin was re-elected treasurer and C. M. Collier clerk.

Since the coming of Rev. H. N. Mount as pastor there has been a net increase in membership of 110, just about doubling the membership of

the church.

During the year a Men's Club has been organized, a Boys' Brigade with 65 members, and a Sunshine Mission Band, consisting of 25 of the young girls of the church. All the services are well attended and the church is in a thrifty condition.

ELOPERS ARE

FREE ONCE MORE

Langley and the Mayes Girl Caught at Roseburg, Liberated at Martinez.

Jesse L. Langley, aged 47, and Miss Theresa Mayes, aged 14, the eloping couple from Antioch, Cal., who were arrested at Roseburg two weeks ago and several days later taken back to California, have been released by the authorities at Martinez. Langley was charged with rape on being arraigned before Justice Long, during his detention in Roseburg, following failure to regain his liberty on writ of habeas corpus. A dispatch from Martinez, dated February 3, says:

"As a result of today's proceedings in the case of Jesse Langley and the 14-year-old girl, Theresa Mayes, with whom the former eloped to Oregon a few weeks ago, both Langley and the girl are free, Judge Wells finding insufficient evidence to hold the man."

"Both parties to the sensational elopement are free in another sense, for County Clerk Rodgers refused to give the pair a marriage license on account of the extreme youth of the Mayes girl—this, too, when the parents of the girl had reluctantly given their consent to the marriage."

VISIT EACH

TYPHOID FEVER

PATIENT

Dr. Matson Making a Thorough Examination of Conditions

Besides Analyzing Water He Will Examine Blood From Several Patients—Measles Are Prevalent

Dr. Ralph C. Matson, state bacteriologist, who is here from Portland to investigate the source of typhoid fever so prevalent at present, met with the physicians of the city in the office of Dr. J. W. Harris last evening and a discussion of the situation was had.

Each physician present reported the location of the cases which he is attending and a plat of the city with each case marked was given Dr. Matson. There are about 70 in all. He is now visiting each house where the fever exists to examine the conditions surrounding. As stated in the Guard yesterday the doctor will take samples of water and milk to Portland for analysis and will also take a few drops of blood, secured from several different patients, for examination.

MEASLES ALSO PREVALENT.

According to the figures of Dr. Harris there are about 50 cases of measles in the city which should be looked after by the authorities. Heretofore cases of measles have not been quarantined, but it is said that hereafter this the law will be complied with and each house where the disease exists will be placed under strict quarantine.

WILL ASSESS

AT CASH

VALUATION

Property Owners Will Pay Taxes on What Property Is Worth

Assessment on Southern Pacific Company's Main Line Will Be Raised Several Thousand Dollars Per Mile

Assessor B. F. Keeney today informed the Guard that this year he will assess all property in the county at its cash value, according to law. A reasonable value will be set upon the property, so that there will be no objection about an excessive taxation. Mr. Keeney says he intended to assess property at its full value last year, but he considered conditions at that time not yet entirely ready for such action. At the convention of assessors in Portland recently this action was agreed upon by the majority of the assessors present.

Assessment will be begun on March first and the assessor is now getting his blanks ready for the work. He urges people who have purchased property since the last assessment to record their deeds at once so that the property can be assessed in their names and not in that of the former owner. The new owners will have to pay the taxes anyway, and by recording their deeds now will save annoyance.

S. P. ASSESSMENT RAISED.

Assessor Keeney said that he intends to raise the assessment on the main line of the Southern Pacific railroad several thousand dollars per mile. At present it is \$4500 per mile, which is considered ridiculously low. At the assessor's meeting in Portland four of the assessors out of the eight on the main line agreed upon a figure which is several thousand dollars above the present assessment in Lane county. Assessor Keeney does not wish to give out the exact figure at present. In Multnomah county the main line will be assessed at \$17,000 per mile.
