NEWS FROM NATIONAL CAPITAL

Fulton Wants \$400,000 For Mouth of Columbia River

President Issues An Appeal Asking Contributions For Famine Stricken Japanese--Longworth Bill For \$5,000,000 Adopted

Washington, Feb. 13.—The president this afternoon issued an appeal to the American people for contributions to aid the famine stricken people in northern Japan.

The Longworth bill, carrying \$5,000,000 for appropriations for grounds and buildings for legations abroad, was adopted by the committee on foreign relations today.

Senator Fulton introduced an amendment to the sundry civil bill appropriating \$400,000 for continuing the improvements at the mouth of the Columbia river. The bill will go to the commerce committee.

The war department confirms the report that another regiment is going to the Orient, probably the 26th Infantry. Additional vessels will also go to the Asiatic station. The Oregon is now at Hong Kong.

GOVERNMENT NOW READY FOR HERMANN

Our Congressman Not Notified of Government's Intention--Does Not Indicate His Course

Washington, Feb. 13.—The termination of the Beavers case makes it possible to immediately commence Hermann's trial, although the government officials will not state that this will be done. Hermann, when asked today if he intended exercising his prerogative as a member of congress to refuse to go to trial during the session, said he did not know. He would take up the matter with his counsel. He had not been notified by the government attorneys that they intended taking up the case during the session of congress, and would determine his course of action after consultation.

THE BEEF TRUST ON THE GRIDIRON

Chicago, Feb. 13.—Hearing of the evidence to sustain the plea of immunity in the beef trust case was resumed this morning. Frank S. Hayward testified concerning the visits of Labor Commissioner Garfield's representative and said that the officer declared there would be no use of matter disclosed by the investigation injurious to the packers.

BIG FIRE AT ELGIN THIS MORNING

Elgin Forwarding Company's Warehouses and Contents Destroyed

Railroad Company Loses Six Cars Which Could Have Been Saved but For Report They Contained Dynamite

Elgin, Or., Feb. 13.—A \$100,000 fire this morning at three o'clock from an unknown source destroyed the Elgin Forwarding Company's warehouses and contents, besides six freight cars on the O. R. & N. track, one car containing coal oil. The cars might have been saved but for the report started that the cars contained dynamite, which frightened the people from the vicinity. The loss is half covered by insurance.

STANDARD OIL INVESTIGATION

Des Moines, Feb. 13.—Attorney-General Hadley, of Missouri, is taking depositions in the Standard Oil case in this city today. He declares the evidence here makes a complete case, and says he is getting evidence which any court will recognize that Standard Oil, the Waters-Pierce and Republic oil companies were conducted as the same company in violation of the laws of Missouri.

BLOWN 40 FEET BY DYNAMITE

Arlington, Or., Feb. 13.—Albert Lawson, a powder man on the north bank railroad, was blown forty feet while thawing dynamite, and then walked a mile to camp with his eye torn out and horribly mangled. He was taken to The Dalles hospital.

Beavers, Former Superintendent of Salaries and Allowances Pleads Guilty

Beavers, former superintendent of salaries and allowances of the postoffice department, this morning pleaded guilty of conspiring with former Senator Green, of New York, to defraud the government in connection with the sale of time recording devices placed in the department. He was sentenced to two years imprisonment in the Moundsville, W. Va., penitentiary.

THOUSANDS ON WAY TO SIBERIA

St. Petersburg, Feb. 13.—Eight hundred revolutionists have been sent to Siberia. This is the first batch of 5000 of the most dangerous insurgents the government expects to deport.

PARLIAMENT MET THIS AFTERNOON

London, Feb. 13.—Parliament met this afternoon. The meeting was informal and merely to select a speaker of the house of commons to swear in new members. James William Lowther was re-elected.

KING'S REMAINS LIE IN STATE

Copenhagen, Feb. 13.—King Christian's body was exposed to view in the Christiansborg palace church today. The body will lie in state three days and then be taken to Roskilde Friday and buried Sunday.
