WILL MAKE TRIP UP THE M'KENZIE

Citizens to View Out Site for Pure Water Supply for City

Will Examine Creek Which Flows Into McKenzie at the Forrest Place, Twenty Miles East of Eugene

A party of citizens, including Geo. Fisher, M. Svarvud, Councilman T. H. Garrett, Judge J. J. Walton, Professor John Straub, Professor Joseph Schafer, Professor E. H. McAllister, Professor O. P. Stafford and Professor A. R. Sweetser, leaves here early tomorrow morning for Major L. D. Forrest's place on the McKenzie river, about twenty miles above Eugene, for the purpose of examining certain creek, a stream which flows into the McKenzie river from the south, with the view of utilizing the water of the creek for a city water plant.

The water of this creek is ice cold at all times, is pure and abundant at all seasons of the year. This place would be an excellent source of a water supply for the city, and it is highly probable that it will be seriously considered when the matter of a municipal plant is settled, and it looks as if the question will again be taken up in the near future.

A MAN WITHOUT A MEMORY

Peculiar Case Occupies Attention of Authorities--"Will Do" Examined as to His Sanity

Yesterday afternoon a young man about 21 years old, neatly dressed and with a tidy appearance, appeared at police headquarters in the city hall and inquired for the chief of police.

He was informed that the chief would be in shortly and he waited his appearance. When Chief Stiles came the man stated that he had been directed to him in hopes of finding his relatives. When the chief asked the man his name he simply replied "Will." He said he didn't remember his surname. The chief at once saw there was something wrong with the man and questioned him further. He didn't know where he came from, didn't know who his folks were, didn't know how he arrived in Eugene--in fact, didn't seem to remember but very little of anything. His memory appeared to be almost a blank. He remembered that he had recently been working in an institute, but didn't remember the nature of the place. He said he had recently been in a large city, but didn't know which city it was. He thought it might have been Portland. When questioned as to how he reached Eugene he said he thought he came on the train, but got off at another station and walked into town.

The man is a puzzle to the authorities, as nothing whatever can be found out about him or his relatives. He had nothing in his pockets, except a scrap of a newspaper and a box of pills. He was lodged in jail last night.

Sheriff Fisk telephoned to the insane asylum this forenoon to learn whether or not the man was an escaped inmate of that institution, but received a negative reply.

SENT TO THE ASYLUM.

The man was taken before County Judge Chrisman this afternoon and examined as to his sanity. He was committed to the asylum at Salem and will be taken down tomorrow.

SOME TYPHOID FEVER EXPERIMENTS

Guinea Pig Dies When inoculated With City Water

The Doctors Bartle and Professor Sweetser Prove Conclusively That the Water Furnished Contained Bacillus

Drs. Bartle and Professor Sweetser have just concluded an experiment that proves beyond a doubt that the city water is responsible for our typhoid epidemic. A few days ago the doctors obtained some water from a city hydrant and segregated the germs, inoculating two small guinea pigs with them. One of the pigs was an old one and had a hard spell of the typhoid, but recovered. The other pig died. An autopsy was held on the latter pig and conclusive evidence was found to show that he died from the result of the inoculation.

ANOTHER EXPERIMENT.

The Doctors Bartle have again inoculated three guinea pigs, this time with the city water direct as it comes to the consumer, and these pigs now have well-developed cases of the fever and one will die from the sickness.

A CAUTION.

The doctors say that hope for the abatement of the disease is in boiled water alone, and that none should be so foolhardy or ignorant as to ignore this matter.

MANY NEW CASES

Yesterday 18 new cases were reported and it is thought as many more exist today. Up to the time of going to press today six new cases have been reported. Nearly all late cases reported can be traced to the city water.
