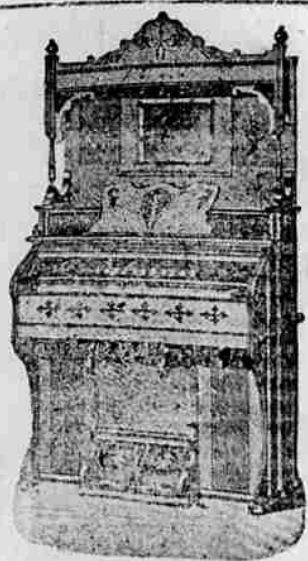


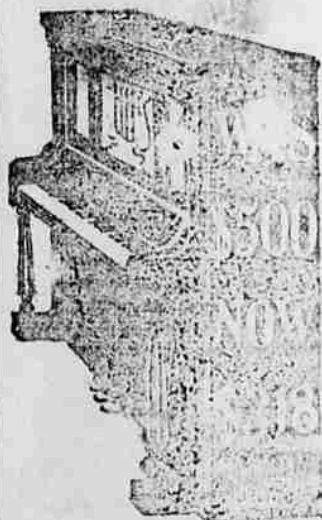

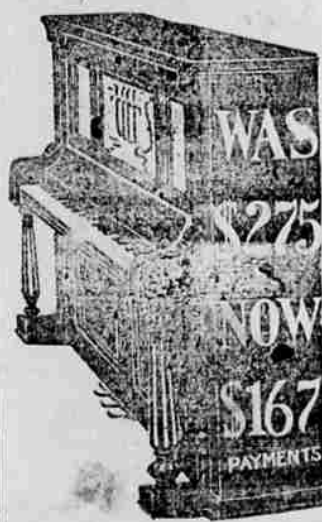

ANOTHER PIONEER GONE TO HIS REST

Another pioneer has gone to his long rest. "Uncle Jack" Knowlton, a resident of Cottage Grove for some 33 years, died Monday morning after a sickness extending over a period of some two or three years.

Porter Davis Knowlton was born September 26, 1826, at Chicopee Falls, Hampden county, Mass. He crossed the plains with an ox team in 1850 for California, moving to Oregon in 1873. He was married in Yamhill county to Sarah J. Martin on January 9th, 1873, coming to Cottage Grove in December of the same year and has resided here ever since.

He leaves, besides a loving wife, the following children: L. D. Knowlton, of Portland; Mrs. H. G. Morris, of Eugene; Mrs. Flegal Hinds, Mrs. Orvel Knapp, H. S. Knowlton and Katie Knowlton, of this city, besides many friends—Nugget.
