Negro View of Negro Question

How may those self-appointed Northern guardians of the negro, all the time raising a hubbub about his alleged treatment in the South, explain this statement of Booker T. Washington, the negro educator, in the December number of the American Illustrated Magazine:

Whatever special difficulties the negro has to face, whatever obstacles race prejudice may place in his way, the negro under freedom has the right to work, at least in the South, and work for the best things the world offers. He has the opportunity to make himself useful and to share the benefits that his genius and labor confer on those around him. That is, it seems to me, what emancipation means, in practice, to the negro. That is, after all, nearly all that it could mean.

Some delicate sarcasm in Mr. Washington's statement that the negro "has the right to work, at least in the South." In the North he has no greater political rights, while except at odd jobs and in more menial occupations the right of labor is denied him.

The late Senator Mitchell's estate will probably yield \$400,000, against which there are about ten thousand dollars of indebtedness. The government has made demand on the administrators for the \$1000 unpaid fine, asserting it is a preferred claim. With the fine and costs of administration out the creditors will receive about twenty-five cents on the dollar.

Since February 13th Southern Pacific lines in Oregon have received fifteen large new locomotives. With tenders they measure 67 feet—four inches more than the full width of a Eugene street—and both loaded to full capacity ready for service they pull the scales down at 161 tons. They will operate between Roseburg and Ashland until the 80-pounds-to-the-yard steel rails are laid from Saginaw to Portland.

A very neat remembrance of Washington's birthday that at Portland Sunday afternoon, when a thousand boys assembled in the Marquam theatre, were addressed by Governor Chamberlain and Judge Franzer. The speakers had a good subject, no other character in profane history approaching that of George Washington for integrity, steadfastness of purpose and bright and unblemished patriotism.

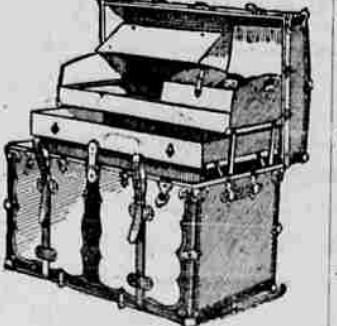
