Fighting the Primary Law

Editor Scott of the Oregonian now fears the primary law which he believed in when Mitchell was alive and which he has long advocated, but —well, Mr. Scott wants to be senator and he believes any means justifiable to secure the prize desired. This is the true reason why he and a certain gang of Oregon politicians desire to put the wishes of the people aside in hope that the rotten political conditions of the past can be continued in Oregon.

When a few politicians attempt to override the people of Oregon, virtually proclaiming them too ignorant to select a proper United States Senator, it is time that they act at the polls and show the politicians that they must obey the voice of the people.

The Guard right now predicts that any Lane county candidate who refuses to act as the people wish in this matter will never sit as a member of the next legislature.

Editor Scott of the Oregonian would like to be senator from Oregon, and for that reason is now opposing the election of a senator by the people, insisting that it is not practical or just, but that the members of the legislature should elect the man.

The Panama Canal continues just as near completion as it has been at any time in the past. The testimony taken by the Senate committee shows that it must be built by alien labor as the climatic conditions are such that American labor cannot work there. Engineer Stevens says this labor must be Chinese, as no other alien labor is suitable. That is just what we want. By all means get the Chinese and save our taxpayers that eighty millions.

I. H. BINGHAM FILES DECLARATION

To E. U. Lee, county clerk of Lane county, Oregon, and to the members of the Republican party and the electors of the county of Lane, state of Oregon, comprising the county of Lane, state of Oregon: I, I. H. Bingham, reside at Eugene, Lane county, Oregon, and my post-office address is Eugene, Lane county, Oregon. I am a duly registered member of the Republican party. If I am nominated for the office of state senator at the primary nominating election to be held in the county of Lane, state of Oregon, the 20th day of April, 1906, I will accept the nomination and will not withdraw, and if I am elected I will qualify as such officer.

If I am nominated and elected I will, during my term of office, work for the state and national aid for the improvement of public highways. I am in favor of and shall work for a law regulating state and private banks. Am in favor of a tax law that will equalize assessments, and compel all property interests, whether tangible or intangible, to pay their just proportion of taxes. Am in favor of such legislation as will permit common carriers to collect tariffs sufficient to pay a fair compensation on the actual investment, operation and maintenance of same, no more. I believe in the enforcement and strict observance of the direct primary law.

I desire that the following statement be printed after my name on the nominating ballot: Will work for the best interests of Lane county and Oregon.

I desire to include in this position

STATEMENT NO. 1.

I further state to the people of Oregon, as well as to the people of my legislative district, that during my term of office I will always vote for that candidate for United States senator in congress who has received the highest number of the people's votes for that position at the general election next preceding the election of a senator in congress, without regard to my individual preference.
