It looks rather surprising, the shipping of railroad ties from Japan to Mexico, old countries with very few exceptions being short of timber. They are made from bigwood trees. On the Yalu river on the mainland there are large bodies of timbers similar to Eastern Oregon pine.

British Columbia sells her timber, not timber lands, as with us. The charges are: Lumber, 50 cents for every thousand feet cut; mining props and lagging and hewed railway ties, 50 cents a cord; cord wood, 25 cents a cord. With such prices here in Oregon quarter sections of timber would bring from one thousand to eight thousand dollars.

The shingle mills of Washington have reopened after a shutdown of sixty days to stiffen prices. Brokers who tried to demoralize the market by quoting a price five cents a thousand under manufacturers' prices were shrewdly met with orders from the manufacturers themselves. Of course the brokers would not fill them at the loss, even if they had the stock.

The representatives at the National Association of Retail Grocers have endorsed the Money amendment to the pure food bill, and it is understood are using all of their influence to secure its adoption. So great is the interest created by this measure that it is estimated that more than 2000 letters and telegrams are being received at Washington every day by members of congress urging its substitution for the Heyburn and Hepburn bills.

Senator Foraker's proposed amendment to the Statehood bill is a just and fair one. It provides that elections shall be held in each territory to determine if it is the will of the people that Arizona and New Mexico shall be admitted as one state, and if a majority of the inhabitants of either territory vote against single statehood then the bill shall have no effect and they shall remain as separate territories. This is right. Why should these people be forced down each other's throats, just for political reasons?

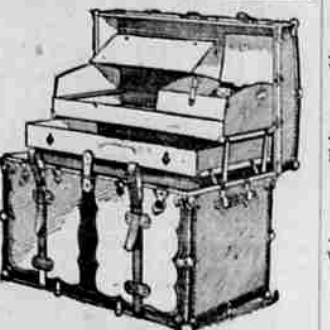
