Cost of War

That the burden of armament lies heavy on Europe is well understood, but it is not so commonly known that in the last ten years the cost of army and navy has increased much more rapidly in Great Britain than in any country of the Continent. The fact is brought out in the Nineteenth Century by Lord Avebury, who is better known to Americans as Sir John Lubbock. He says:

"In our own case (the British) there has been on the army an increase in the past ten years of \$124,000,000 and on the navy an increase of \$125,000,000; or, taking the two together, in round figures an increase of no less than \$249,000,000, of which, however, only \$195,000,000 is shown in the ordinary estimates. In other words while Italy has increased her naval and military expenditures by \$7,500,000; Russia, \$50,000,000; Germany, \$45,000,000; and France, \$30,000,000, we have increased ours \$250,000,000. Thus these four great countries put together show an increase of \$135,000,000, while ours by itself is \$250,000,000, or nearly double that of Russia, Germany, France and Italy put together. What justification have we for this enormous increase? I do not wish to exaggerate nor to maintain that we are going down hill, but our progress has been checked, and if we are not wise in time worse will follow."

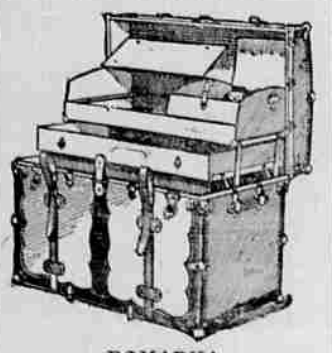
