TWO-YEAR-OLD BOY SERIOUSLY BURNED

The little boy and his brother were upstairs playing while their mother was preparing breakfast. The mother heard the little fellow scream and running upstairs found his clothing ablaze. They were soon extinguished but it was found that the little boy was terribly burned on the left side from the knee to the top of his head. Dr. F. W. Prentice was called and he pronounced the burns serious.

The older brother told that he had struck a match and the child's gown in some manner caught fire from that. The child's father is a Southern Pacific bridge carpenter and is at present working at Leland in Southern Oregon.

STATE BOARD OF HEALTH TO BE HERE

Will Assist in Selecting Site for City Water Works Wells

After Water Is Secured It Will Be Analyzed Every Thirty Days-- Filters Will Make It Doubly Pure

The members of the state board of health today telephoned Mayor F. M. Wilkins that they will be in Eugene Monday of next week, at which time they will assist the mayor, city council, the committee from the Merchants' Protective Association and the officers of the water company in selecting a site for wells for a pure supply of water for the city.

The state board will remain here several days and thoroughly examine each location proposed. Water from various places will be analyzed and the place where the water is purest and where the lay of the country is most conducive to a good supply will be selected.

BATTLESHIP OREGON'S FLAG SECURED

Huge Banner Flown at Battle of Santiago Now Owned by the University of Oregon

President P. L. Campbell, of the University of Oregon, was surprised to receive from the Bremerton, Wash., navy yard a large American flag. A certificate accompanied the banner explaining that it is the battleflag that the Oregon flew at her masthead during the memorable fight off Santiago July 4, 1898.

President Campbell says J. M. Simmons, of Bremerton, corresponded with him one year ago about the flag, as he learned at the navy yard, where several battleships were being docked, that their colors were to be condemned and burned.

Mr. Simmons interested himself in the matter and has at last secured the banner. It is accompanied by a properly certified statement as to its being the flag that the battleship flew the day she ran away from the American fleet to give the Spaniards a drubbing. At present the historic flag will be hung in the assembly room at Villard hall.

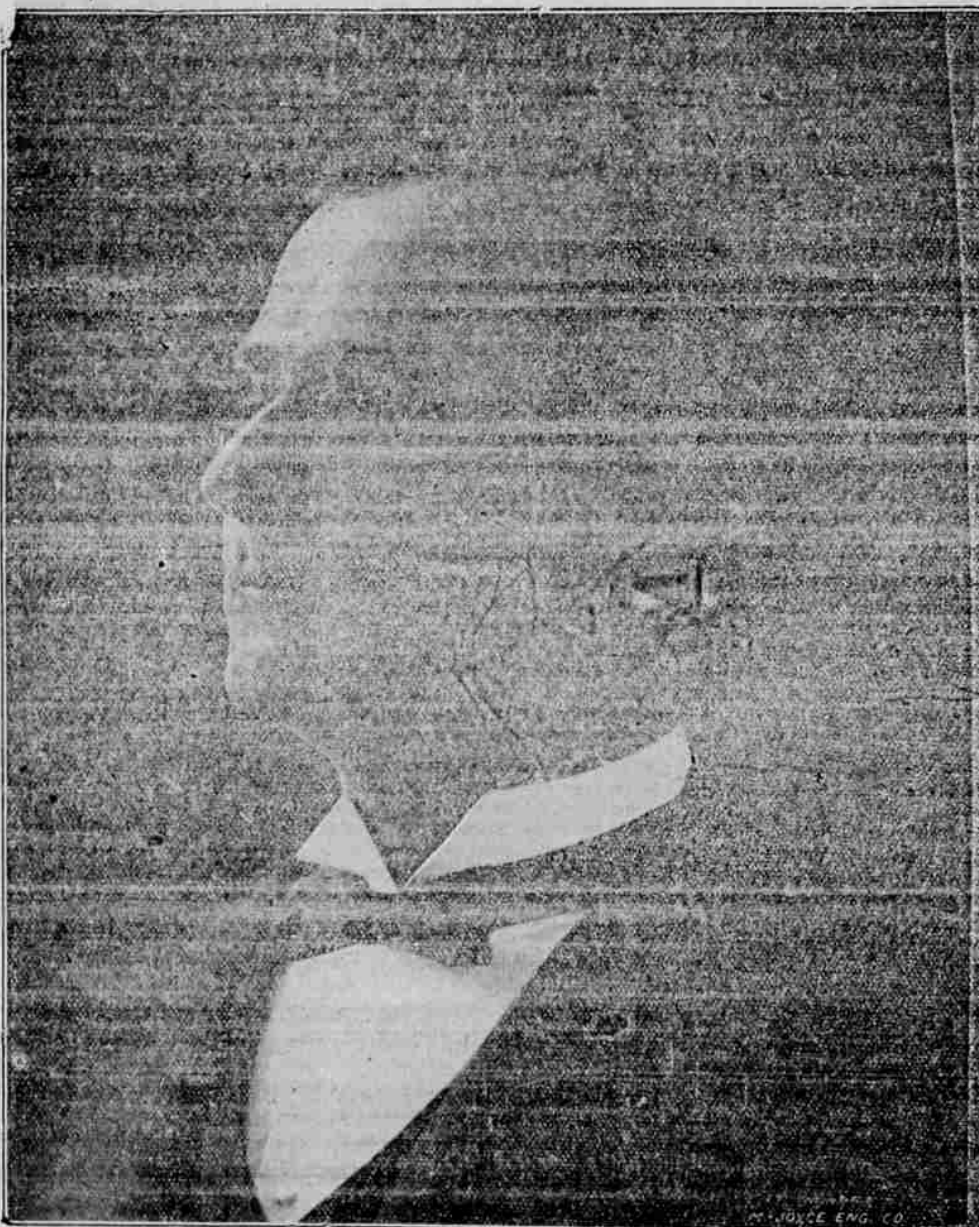
