Chamberlain's Record

Governor Chamberlain is going to ask for an endorsement of his past administration. If he has not made an efficient officer, if he has not been an able, courageous and energetic governor let the people of Oregon, by the ballot, say as much next June and Governor Chamberlain will retire from the head of the state with his habitual grace and becoming dignity.

If the people wanted honesty and efficiency in office they have had their desire in the office of the state's chief executive. No criticism has been heard, not a shadow of suspicion has hung over his high place, while "guilty as charged" is the brand that a jury of twelve honest men has placed upon one after another of Oregon's prominent public servants.

Of late years the political sky of our country has been black and threatening, and out of its darkness has come a foreboding of political debauchery, public calamity and a revel of high-handed robbery and universal corruption. In places the dread has become a reality. But here and there a kindly star has shown itself, a ray of hope and cheer to the multitude that loves honesty, morality and high purpose in public affairs. In national affairs the president; in Missouri that star has been Folk; in New York, Jerome; in Lafayette, Wisconsin, and in Oregon, George E. Chamberlain.

Would New York give up her Jerome? In the face of machines, bosses and political combinations the people with a single voice called him into continued service. Would the people forsake Folk or Lafayette? Not while the people love manliness, courage, honesty and efficiency in those whom they honor with high places. Would the people of Oregon renounce Chamberlain? Not on the strength of a senseless party cry. Not for a return to the old system of official loot and pillage. Not for any seditious bait that contriving political manipulators may cast before them.

The record that is complete and faultless will receive a splendid commendation next June. It will be no triumph of a man. Principle, honesty and official probity will gain the victory over chicanery and political trickery.—Oregon City Courier.

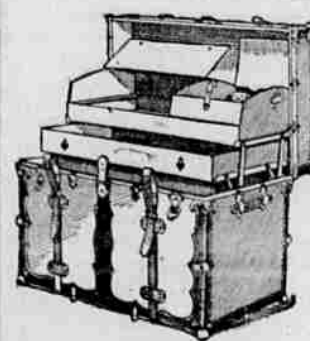
