Scarcity of Small Bills and Silver

There seems to be an eternal scarcity in this country of the smaller denominations of current money.

In the past this has apparently been the result of policies adopted by the government to encourage the circulation of one or another kind of money. Now that the currency is on a fairly sound basis, there is no need of these forcing operations and the treasury ought to be willing to give the people the kind of money they want.

For some time the treasury was unable to supply the demand for fractional silver. The amount of this was limited by law, and the friends of legal tender objected to increasing the limit. That was finally done and the treasury has coined all of its silver bullion without satisfying the demand. Now there is a bill before congress to authorize the recoinage of silver dollars into fractional currency—that is, to turn coins that people do not want into those they do want.

There is also a scarcity of \$1 and \$2 bills. It has been the policy of the government to limit these small notes to silver certificates. There are no bank notes under \$5 and very few greenbacks. On the other hand most of the \$5 notes are silver certificates, while the \$10 notes are roughly divided between bank notes and legal tenders. The \$20 notes are divided in the same rough proportion between gold certificates and bank notes.
