WORK OF RECONSTRUCTING ROAD BED S. P. Crows Laying the New 80-Pound Steel Rails

Gravel Bed Across the River From the Haines Tannery Will Be Opened Up—Gravel to Be Used as Ballast

Two Southern Pacific reconstruction crews are working from opposite directions toward Eugene, and it is expected that they will meet somewhere in the vicinity of Goshen in about two weeks. These crews are laying 80-pound steel rails recently distributed along this stretch of the road.

One crew, consisting of about 85 Greeks and 40 Japanese, is now between Irving and Luper, working toward Eugene at the rate of about three-fourths of a mile each day. The other crew is working between Walker and Creswell, but being smaller than the one to the north is making slower progress. There is still another crew north of Junction, and several more in Linn and Marion counties.

Only the work of laying the new rails is being done at present. Some time in the early summer the entire road will be reconstructed, the new ties for the work now being distributed along the line.

WILL OPEN GRAVEL BED.

The gravel bed on the island across the river from the old Haines tannery in this city will soon be opened up by the railroad company, a temporary trestle constructed across the river and the gravel used for ballasting. The roadbed will be raised five or six inches, the new ties laid and with the new rails now being put in the track through the valley will be as substantial as any in the West.

BIG BASKETBALL GAME TOMORROW

The Chicago Meteor Y. M. C. A. basketball team will arrive tomorrow to play a match game here with the local high school team. The Meteors are on a trip across the continent and have played 53 games, so far having won all but seven of them.
