Eddy Found Not Guilty by the Jury

The jury in the Jesse Eddy robbery case returned a verdict of not guilty last evening and the defendant was discharged from custody.

Last evening the grand jury returned an indictment against Victor Fitzer, William Cavelor and John Doe Brady for larceny from the person. These are the men accused of robbing W. W. Scott, of Creswell, in the rear of the Manhattan saloon several months ago. In the justice court Brady was acquitted. Fitzer and Cavelor were arraigned.

A demurrer to the indictment was overruled and the prisoners entered a plea of not guilty. The trial of Fitzer then began. The following jury was chosen: E. E. Aubrey, J. M. Holland, I. E. STATE BOARD RETURNS

HOME

Will Make a Report on Conditions Here Within a Short Time

Party Driven to Springfield, to Day's Island and Other Points This Forenoon--Beard Given a Dinner Last Evening

The several members of the state board of health who were here to look into health conditions and examine proposed sites for a future source of water supply, returned to their homes this afternoon.

The members of the board, accompanied by Mayor F. M. Wilkins, officials of the water company and a number of other citizens, started out early this morning in carriages and first drove to Springfield and looked into the health conditions there in regard to closets bordering on the mill race and river. They then drove over the prairie northwest of Eugene, looked over the several sloughs and swales in that section and drove to Day's Island, where it has been proposed to locate the wells for the new water works.

Dr. Robert C. Yenney, secretary of the board, and state health officer, stated to a Guard reporter just before leaving on the train that he had data concerning conditions here and the board would make a report just as soon as it can get to it. Dr. Yenney requested that a plat of the sewer system and water mains be sent him, and Mayor Wilkins will have one prepared and send it tomorrow.

BOARD BANQUETED.

Last evening at the Hotel Smeede the members of the state board were given a dinner by the Lane County Medical Society. After the dinner a meeting was held at the office of J. W. Harris, county health officer. Several addresses were made, among which was one by Dr. Yenney, who took occasion to compliment the physicians of Eugene and the people in general for the successful manner in which they have coped with the recent epidemic.

Note and Comment

A dispatch from Eugene to the Pendleton Tribune shows how fast false, fake news can travel. The dispatch in question, under big black headlines, tells how "even cows in Eugene have typhoid fever," "how a cow drank unboiled water and how the doctor treated her, etc., etc." The entire report was a fake. Cows do not have typhoid fever in Eugene or elsewhere, and there was no reason for the publication of such a story. These fake items are what has hurt Eugene, and reports that people are dying like rats, that cows have typhoid fever, cat scarlet fever and grizzly bears spinal meningitis in Eugene are all untrue. All accounts seem to be grossly exaggerated.

The Oregonian is happy because the Portland gas trust was compelled to reduce prices. The Oregonian at one time was quite a trust itself, but it, like the gas trust, has been forced to furnish its paper at greatly reduced rates.

ENDORSE STATEMENT NUMBER 1

Hardy and Washburne File Thier Nominating Petitions

Candidates for Representatives on the Republican Ticket--Interests of Oregon and Lane County Are Their Interests

Charles A. Hardy, of Eugene, and B. A. Washburne, of Springfield, have filed their petitions for the nomination of representative on the Republican ticket. Both candidates endorse "Statement No. 1," advocating the election of U. S. senators by the direct vote of the people.

Mr. Hardy states that if nominated and elected he will work for the development of Lane county and state of Oregon. He is in favor of legislation regulating state and private banks, a fair and economic system of assessment and taxation, liberal appropriations for the University of Oregon and improvement of public highways. He desires the following printed after his name on the nominating ballot: "I will work for the development of Oregon and Lane county."

Mr. Washburne states that he will exercise the same caution and judgment in his official duties as in his personal business affairs. He wishes the following placed after his name on the ballots: "The interests of Lane county and Oregon are my interests."

WORK ON DRAIN-COOS BAY ROAD

Will Begin on April 10--Right-of-Way Agent Locating the Stations

J. W. Nier, the right-of-way agent for the Southern Pacific company, in an interview with the representative of the North Bend Harbor, at Scottsburg, Thursday evening, stated that work on the Drain road would begin April 10th. This is as it was announced officially in the Harbor last week.

Mr. Nier said that the company had asked him what time they could commence work on the grade and he had replied that he would be ready by that time.

He has had some trouble in getting right-of-way between Drain and Elkton and may in two places have to begin condemnation proceedings.

The right-of-way work is being done very carefully. The abstracts of title have to be passed upon before payments are made.

Mr. Nier is now working on the right-of-way between Elkton and Scottsburg, which is as far as the maps have been completed. He said that he would be on Coos Bay in about six weeks.

He decides upon the stations as he goes along and aims to get them about five miles apart. He has located stations at Putnam valley, Bush creek, Elkton, Hart creek, Paradise creek, Butler's and Scottsburg. The exact location at Elkton has not been determined as the town is on a curve.

GEORGE CURRY, PIONEER, DEAD

Colonel George B. Curry died suddenly of apoplexy at LaGrande, Oregon, March 10, aged 73. He came to Oregon in 1852, locating at Eugene. He was employed for a time in the land office, then located here. He served in the Southern Oregon Indian war in Co. D, Captain M. M. Williams, the first part of 1850. He resided at Canyon City, Grant county, several years. Served as commander at Fort Walla Walla, also, as register of LaGrande land office in early days. He was a lawyer by profession.
